SPRING COMMENCEMENT ceremonies will begin at 9:30 a.m. Friday when approximately 70 graduate and 690 undergraduate students will begin the traditional academic procession from Baldwin Auditorium to Stokes Stadium. Enroute, the procession will travel to the quadrangle where the undergraduate with the highest grade point average will lay a wreath at the foot of a statue of Joseph Baldwin, the University's founder and first president. The Commencement address, scheduled to begin at 10 a.m., will be delivered by Dr. Phyllis Mullenix, an instructor in the Department of Neuropathology of Harvard Medical School in Boston. The 1970 magna cum laude graduate of NMSU returns to her hometown where she completed a B.S. in Zoology. University President Charles J. McClain will confer degrees upon candidates. In case of rain, Commencement exercises will be held in Pershing Arena.
