West Speaks on World Hunger and Poverty

Melvin West, board member for the Heifer Project and for Habitat for Humanity, will make a presentation at 7 p.m. on Nov. 27, in the SUB Alumni Room. West's presentation is titled "El Roblegal and a Woman Named Miracle" and will be about the slow transformation of a poverty village. Basic conclusions from that transformation about how hunger can be eradicated from the world, both overseas and in the United States, will be discussed.

West holds a bachelor's degree in agriculture from the University of Missouri-Columbia. He was a teacher of agriculture in the Golden City, Mo., school system for seven years. In 1954, West entered the ministry and received degrees in theology in 1965 from Southern Methodist University. That same year, he was appointed director of the Office of Creative Minis-

tries of the United Methodist Church in Missouri. Under his direction, that office developed, directed and sponsored 30 mission projects. Many were in Missouri, but much of the work was focused on agricultural self-development work in third-world countries. In 1986, West retired from the ministry.

West is presently on the boards of Heifer Project International, which donates genetically improved livestock to third-world farmers to improve their herds; Habitat for Humanity, an organization which builds housing for the needy; and Servants in Faith and Technology. West is also active in the United Methodist Rural Fellowship which is an advocacy/service organization for 26,000 rural churches. Each year, he and his wife take work groups overseas; soon, they will be leaving for Costa Rica.

Frost Finalist for Player of the Year

Senior quarterback Jeff Frost is one of nine finalists for the 1990 Harlon Hill Trophy, which is presented to the NCAA Division II Football Player of the Year.

The recipient will be announced at an awards banquet in Sheffield, Ala., Dec. 7. Three trophy finalists will be brought to the Shoals area in northwest Alabama Dec. 5 for the Division II national football championship week activities. The three finalists will be announced Dec. 3.

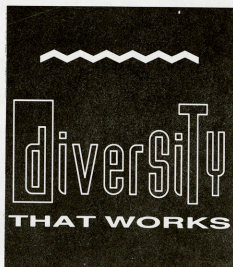

As a senior, he completed 172 of 310 passes for 2,295 yards and 21 touchdowns.

The Bulldogs finished second in the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association after they had been picked for eighth place.

Frost was named Don Hansen's *Football Gazette* National Offensive Player of the week of Oct. 8 after leading the Bulldogs to a 43-42 win over Central State (Ohio), then-ranked second in NIAA Division I.

Faculty Ticket Information

Faculty/staff members may pick up two general admission tickets for each home basketball game at no charge. There are no single game reserved seats or faculty/staff season tickets sold for basketball.
