Lyceum Features Circus



The "greatest show on earth" is coming to Northeast. No, it isn't the Ringling Brothers, but it is a circus, and one reviewer described the Pickle Family Circus as "the real greatest show on earth." The Pickle Family Circus, a Lyceum event, will take place at 7:30 p.m., Feb. 15 and 16, in Baldwin Auditorium.

Pickle Family Circus is a modern circus, combining comedy, drama, dance, music, and acrobatics in a one-ring show. Clowning, juggling, aerial acts, and acrobatics are intertwined with a story line, and all these traditional circus antics are performed by a

company of only 11 to the original Pickle Family music played by their own five-piece jazz band.

The Pickle Family Circus originated in 1974 in San Francisco as an offspring of the San Francisco Mime Troupe. They are the first in the United States to establish an intimate, one-ring, European-style circus. The show includes no animal acts, and instead emphasizes acting, mime, and lots of acrobatics. Talented clowns hold the show together.

Their 1992-1993 show, "Tossing and Turning," is coming to Kirksville as part of a national tour. The story, a clown comedy, centers around "Razz," who can't get to sleep, and "Pino," who mischievously tries to keep him awake. His dreams, brought by Pino, are overrun with fantastic figures like tumbling sheep, a marching band of trash cans, and late night refrigerator raids with dancing food.

The dream world created at the circus features the Chinese arts of hoop-vinging, pole-climbing and plate-balancing, and, of course, trapeze artistry. Brother Sun and Sister Moon "snake around each other in a dance of aerial abstraction as intimate as lovemaking," as one reviewer described the trapeze act.

Tandy Beal, director, blends all these tricks together into one whimsical package, tied together by the story and her "corkscrew choreography."

1993 Baldwin Lecture



"The Community of Higher Education: Our challenges for the future" is the title of the 1993 Baldwin Lecture, which will be at 8 p.m. on Feb. 17. This year's lecture, co-sponsored by the Faculty Development Committee and the University Speaker

Series, will feature Henry Ramsey, Jr., dean of Howard University School of Law.

Ramsey received a bachelor's degree from the University of California-Berkeley in 1960, his Bachelor of Law from the Boalt School of Law of the University of California-Berkeley, and he participated in the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard University in 1992. Before becoming the 21st dean of the Howard University School of Law, Ramsey served on the law faculty at Boalt Hall Law School and the University of California-

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Tel-Alumni Sets \$125,000 Goal



The second phase of the University's 13th annual Tel-Alumni campaign began Jan. 26. The first phase was completed late last fall and raised \$55,556. This year's goal is \$125,000, in recognition of Northeast's 125th anniversary.

During the overall campaign, faculty, staff and students will attempt to contact more than 18,000 alumni across the country. Thirty

phones, located in the Student Union Building Rooms 2 and 3, will be used each evening, Sunday through Thursday from 6:15 to 9:15 p.m. Volunteers will be given a complimentary meal, soft drinks while calling and nightly prizes.

Proceeds from Tel-Alumni are placed in the NMSU Development Fund, an agency of the University, which receives, manages and distributes all private financial support given to NMSU. Assets of the Fund are invested and the resulting interest income provides funding for scholarships, student loans, instructional support and other projects supplementing state funding.

Arabian Horses Donated to Agricultural Studies



Two purebred Arabian horses were donated to the NMSU Agricultural Studies program by Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Sieloff of Tawas City, Mich. and their daughter, Debra Sieloff of St. Clair Shores, Mich. Sue Ross, a local Arabian horse breeder and former riding instructor at NMSU, was instrumental in arranging the contract between NMSU and the Sieloffs.

The grey seven-year-old Egyptian Arabian stallion, Ibn Naseri, has been shown in Michigan Class A halter, English and show

hack classes. He has also been ridden with western tack. Additionally, he was standing at stud at the Cahill Training Center in Goodrich, Mich. near Flint. Ibn Naseri has an appraised value of \$50,000. The other horse is a 10-year-old grey mare named Zamereca Zailma. She is a Class A halter champion and has been shown in western pleasure classes. She is a proven producer and has had a foal by Ibn Naseri. Her appraised value is \$18,000.

"The horses are a valuable addition to the horse program at NMSU and will add to the educational experience of all of our students," said David Cross, assistant professor of equine science. "The acquisition of these horses adds diversity to the horse program, which will serve to attract a variety of future students." Both animals will be used for breeding purposes and horsemanship instruction. Donations such as this one by the Sieloffs are the backbone of the program and are vital to the growth and development of Agricultural Studies at NMSU.

The NMSU horse herd is comprised of quarter horses, including the 1976 national Cutting Horse Association Champion Lena's Botina, a few thoroughbred horses and eight Arabian horses including the new additions.
