Symphony Makes 24th Visit to NMSU

The nation's second oldest major orchestra will return to the NMSU stage for its 24th appearance as the Lyceum Series presents the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra in concert at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 14. The Orchestra will perform under the direction of Kirk Muspratt, affiliate artist assistant conductor. Financial assistance has been provided by Union Electric and the Missouri Arts Council.

For more than a century, the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra has maintained a great musical tradition. The internationally renowned 101-member organization, founded in 1880, has increased its original six annual concerts to more than 240.

Much of the Symphony's success has been attributed to the ensemble's director Leonard Slatkin. This year marks Slatkin's 10th anniversary as music

director; he previously held the positions of assistant and associate conductor of the Orchestra. This year also marks Muspratt's second year as affiliate artist assistant conductor. Muspratt also serves as music director of the Saint Louis Symphony Youth Orchestra.

In 1988, Muspratt was a Conducting Fellow at the Los Angeles Philharmonic Institute, where, as one of only three young conductors selected, he conducted regularly at the Hollywood Bowl. He has led the Detroit Symphony Orchestra at the Meadow Brook Music Festival and had engagements with the Orchestra London Canada and the Victoria Symphony Orchestra.

Muspratt has held the position of assistant conductor at the opera houses of Krefeld and Monchengladbach in West Germany. He has also served as music director for both the Grande Prairie

Symphony Orchestra and the Edmonton Philharmonic Orchestra and has conducted the Rome Festival Orchestra and the Vienna Chamber Symphony Orchestra.

The Symphony has an extensive discography, producing recordings which have been nominated for Grammy Awards 11 years in a row. In 1985, the ensemble won two Grammy Awards for the RCA recording of Prokofiev's Fifth Symphony, and in 1987, the Orchestra received the Outstanding Orchestral Recording Award for Shostakovich's Symphony No. 5.

The use of cameras and recording equipment during the performance will be prohibited.

Beginning Feb. 10, free tickets will be available for students, faculty and staff at the Student Activities Board Office in the SUB.

University Hosts National Art Exhibition

The Division of Fine Arts recently conducted a national art competition, the first of its kind ever held on the NMSU campus. The competition was held Jan. 25, and an exhibition of the winning artwork will be displayed.

The competition was organized by the Art Club and faculty and staff of the Division of Fine Arts. All artists in the United States were eligible to participate. Bob Jones, associate professor of art, said 131 artists submitted work in slide form; 469 slides were received.

The slides were sent to Dore Ashton, who juried the competition. Jones said Ashton was chosen to serve as juror because the committee wanted someone prestigious and knowledgeable in art criticism or art history.

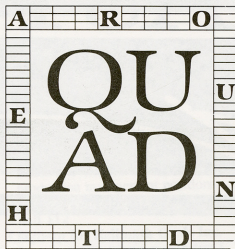
"Ashton selected 40 (slides) to be judged here," Jones said. "She then came to campus to verify what she picked and select a winner."

Ashton participated in an open forum Jan. 25 on campus. She said work that moves her is the best.

Ashton is vice president of the International Arts Critics Association and serves on the advisory board for the John Guggenheim Foundation. She is a member of the Smithsonian Advisory Council and Society of Fellows of New York University. She also serves as art critic for *The New York Times* and has authored several books. She received a bachelor's from the University of Wisconsin, a master's from Harvard University and honorary doctorates from Hamline University and Moor College of Art.

Howard Rosenfeld of Los Angeles, Calif., and Deborah Zlotzky of Storrs, Conn., the top two winners, will have a two-person show Feb. 8 through March 3 in the Baldwin Art Gallery. Second runner-up, Dick Davison of

Scholarship Honors Sen. Goldwater

To pay tribute to Sen. Barry M. Goldwater for his 56 years of service as a soldier and statesman, the United States Congress has established an endowed recognition in his name, the Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Program. In this first year of the program, 106 Goldwater Scholars will be chosen for 1989-90.

To be eligible, a student must be a current full-time sophomore or junior and must be pursuing a baccalaureate degree, have a B average or equivalent, stand in the upper fourth of the class and be a U.S. citizen or U.S. national heading toward a career in mathematics or the natural sciences.

One student who will be a college junior and one student who will be a college senior during the 1989-90 academic year will be selected from each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and considered as an entity, Guam, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands. In addition, 106 Alternate Scholars from those same jurisdictions may be chosen.

The scholarship will cover the cost of tuition, fees, books, and room and board, up to a maximum of \$7,000. Junior-level scholars will be eligible for a second year.
