A NEW PHILOSOPHY is surfacing in the residence halls under the leadership of Ron Gaber, director of housing.

The main objective of this philosophy is to recognize that "students are adults and if given responsibility they will accept it," says Gaber. He feels that past residence hall regulations have not reflected this policy.

Two primary expectations of residents are to (1) respect one another's rights and (2) accept responsibility for one's actions. Based upon responsibility, students are free to exhibit their choice of behavior in their life styles, according to Gaber.

The change will be slow, he says, but within several years residence hall life should be "a valuable means for growth of the total self."
