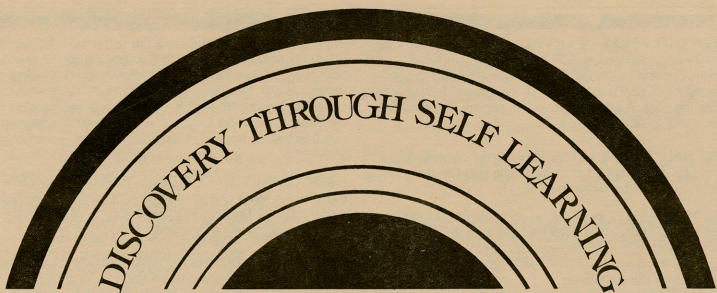
## NORTHEAST NOTES

## Exploring new horizons with Discover

"Welcome to Discover—An Exciting Adventure in Career Development."

This is the friendly message students receive when beginning work on the computer-based guidance system, Discover. Students gain access to this career exploration tool at any IBM terminal at 303 Administration/Humanities Building (Center 303); Pickler Memorial Library; the Violette Hall terminal rooms and the Freshman Counseling Office, A/H 102.

After entering a Social Security number and a birthdate so Discover can keep track of each student's experience, the program moves into a section of in-depth exploration called "How Discover Can Help."

This section displays the areas a user can explore: values, decision-making, occupations, interests, strengths and specific career plans. It takes 15 hours to complete the entire program, but a person can work on it at his own pace, usually after meeting the first time with a counselor in Center 303. Instructions are provided for operation, and the computer provides information on how to proceed and options for what to do next.

Freshman Mark Garton of Ogden, Iowa, was intrigued that all the information about career exploration was at his fingertips. He spent nearly 15 hours exploring Discover, and even brought his high school counselor to NMSU to see what Discover was all about.

Theresa Byrd, a sophomore public administration major, said she went through the program because she was an undecided major at the time and her freshman

counselor, Elsie Gaber, recommended it to her. She said, "At first, I thought it was going to be boring and hard. It was easy."

She took the interest test, identified such occupations as marketing analysis, law and management, and these, along with other measures, helped her narrow down a major choice. "I learned a lot about myself," she said.

Tammy Helmick, a freshman from Greentop, Mo., found that Discover was valuable in indicating careers in which she was interested.

"I had looked at (the job of) foreign interpreter, but I decided that it was too much. I would have to learn two foreign languages and speak them without an accent. That would be too much school for what I want." She is fairly sure, after using Discover, that she wants an occupation in business, perhaps as a word processor.

Helping students choose a career or major is basically what Discover is all about. But, the help doesn't stop there. Discover also assists students with information on job-seeking skills and interviews; financial aid; graduate schools; the military; and even mid-career job changes.

The computer's seemingly endless store of knowledge makes it an invaluable reference tool—a library at your fingertips. This computer-turned-counselor/librarian accomplishes these tasks through a program as good-natured as any human adviser. Discover sets you out on your own once you sign off the program with a cordial "Have a Good Day."
