Fountain Receives Grant

Kenneth Fountain, associate professor of chemistry, recently received approval for a \$20,000 grant from the Petroleum Research Fund of the American Chemical Society. Fountain will study "Methyl Transfers between Hydroxamic Acids," an area of great interest in the field of physical organic chemistry. Grants from ACS are considered difficult to obtain; only 35 percent of applicants are funded.

For the next two years, Fountain will collaborate with scientist Erwin Bunzel of Queens University in Ontario on the project. Bunzel, who was the first 1987 Science Seminar speaker, was impressed with Fountain's work and was willing to help in the research, Fountain said. As principal investigator, Fountain will send samples of his research to Bunzel to be tested on sophisticated apparatus that the University does not own.

Sophomore Bernice Michaels, a.k.a. poof the magic dragon, will assist Fountain this summer on the research.

"The great thing about this grant is that it allows me to give students research experience during the summer and to pay them," Fountain said.

The project is "research for its own sake," and has no immediate practical application. It will, Fountain hopes, lead to insight into biological reactions that occur at an extraordinary rate.

This is the seventh grant awarded to Fountain from ACS in 15 years. He received a \$117,438 grant in 1985 for corrosion-inhibitor research in cooperation with Orscheln Co., of Moberly, Mo. Fountain invented a corrosion inhibitor which is used on parking-brake cables. The grant helped him put that invention into large-scale production.

"Nearly all my research projects have resulted in publications of the results in journals with an undergraduate's and my name on it," Fountain said.

One of Fountain's proudest accomplishments is his Tetrahedron Letters, a research project that resulted in the text, "Advanced Organic Chemistry" by Jerry March, citing Fountain and his work.

"To think how many scientists labor in obscurity . . . To have something like this happen is just fantastic," Fountain said.
