The NMSU Lyceum Series presents the Grammy Award-winning Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra, as it returns to campus for its 26th appearance on Dec. 12 at 8:30 p.m.

The Saint Louis Symphony is recognized as one of the finest ensembles in the nation by critics and audiences alike. This year marks the 111th season of performances for the Orchestra making it the second oldest symphony in the nation.

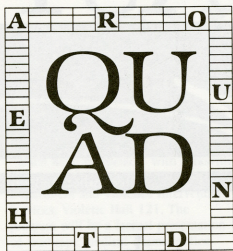
Directing the symphony on this year's appearance in Kirksville will be Associate Conductor David Loebel. He is also music director of

the Saint Louis Symphony Youth Orchestra and conducts educational concerts and regional performances. Loebel first directed the Saint Louis Symphony in 1989, leading works by emerging American composers as part of the American Symphony Orchestra League's New Music Project. During the 1989-90 season he conducted several of the SLSO's regional and special concerts and was assisting conductor for its tour of the eastern United States, Korea and Japan.
