Symphony Scheduled for Jan. 15

The first Lyceum event of 1992 will be a performance by the internationally recognized Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra. The group will perform in concert at 8 p.m., Jan. 15, in Baldwin Auditorium. Free tickets for students, faculty and staff will be available beginning Jan. 13 in the Student Activities Board Office, SUB.

The concert, which marks the Symphony's 27th return to Northeast's stage, will feature Fugue from Symphony No. 4 by Ives, Symphony No. 38 in D Major, K. 504 by Mozart and Symphony No. 7 in A major, Op. 92 by Beethoven.

Intern Heads Recycling Program

Kathleen Schulz, junior biology major, is the University's first recycling intern.

Schulz says she was hired to "design, promote and implement a program that involves campus-wide recycling and the education of the campus community about that program."

Schulz began working at the beginning of the fall semester and will continue through the spring.

The University was running a recycling program when she started, having taken over when O.S.C.A.R. (Organization of Students

Concerned About Resources) stopped running campus-wide recycling. Schulz's job is to refine that program.

She began by examining the program to see where change was needed. Areas she is examining include how much recyclable material is being produced, where the recycle containers are, and the procedures for collecting the materials and taking them to the recycling center.

By the end of the spring semester, Schulz hopes to have a working, permanent program.

After graduation, Schulz would like to work in an area involving environmental issues, such as running a recycling program or consulting. She says that her experience as the recycling intern has helped her learn not only about the recycling program, but also how to work in a business situation as she has contact with many campus offices.

Schulz says that everyone she has talked to has been very supportive of the recycling program and has been willing to help. However, she encourages members of the campus community to watch where they are throwing their garbage. Contamination of recyclable materials happens frequently when people put trash in a recycle container.

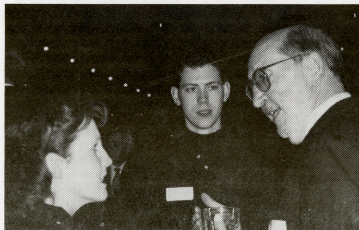

New Student Government Organization Formed

A convention of student governments was held on Nov. 8-10 at Northeast. As a result of the conference, the Missouri Organization of Student Governments (MOSG) was formed. Participating schools are: Central Missouri State University, Coffey College, Southeast Missouri State University, Washington University, William Jewell College and Northeast Missouri State.

MOSG has many purposes. One goal is to create an atmosphere in which Missouri student governments can exchange ideas. Another is to promote leadership skills among member schools. MOSG hopes to utilize its combined influence to lobby state government for higher education legislation. A final goal is to promote unity in student government within individual schools and between universities around the state.

Several Northeast Student Senators presented at the convention. Presenting were: Angela Schepers, "Establishing Positive Relationships with Faculty: The NMSU Educator of the Year"; Teri Brickey and Rita Hiscocks, "From Student Senate Resolution to Board of Governors Policy:

The NMSU Sexual Harassment Policy"; Joe Bambenek and Dewey Streiber, "Student Senate's Vision for the Future"; Chris Lofgren, "Publicizing Student Government to the Student Body"; Teri Brickey, "Missouri Student Government Network: Where should it go? What should it be?"; Rita Hiscocks, "Board of Curators, Governors, or Regents: Student Representative Accountability"; John Haley, "Missouri Student Government Network: Where should it go? What should it be?"; Lauren Reinhold, "Recycling: From Student Movement to University Responsibility"; and Mark Miller led a variety of icebreakers.

Bill Cummins, Northeast's Educator of the Year for 1991 and professor of Spanish, delivered the opening keynote address. He spoke of the importance of establishing positive student/faculty relationships.

The final keynote address was given by former Student Senate President Jeff Milke. Milke's speech emphasized the importance of supporting and empowering the student governments of the state of Missouri.

Holiday Safety Tips

The following tips to protect your possessions while away from the holidays are from Safety and Security.

- ▶ Make your home look lived in.
- ▶ Use automatic timers on lights throughout the house. Timers can turn lights off and on at different times. Use timers to turn radios and television sets on and off.
- ▶ Stop paper deliveries when you go away. Have your mail delivery stopped or get a neighbor to pick your mail every day.
- ▶ Ask a neighbor to change the positions of drapes and window shades daily.
- ▶ If possible, leave a car in the driveway.
- ▶ Have your phone disconnected or connect your phone to an answering machine. If your phone service has call-forwarding, have the calls forwarded to a family member or friend's phone while away. This will deter a burglar who might call to check to see if anyone was home.
- ▶ Most importantly, identify all of your belongings. If your property is clearly marked with your social security number you have a better chance of recovering items that were stolen and found.

R. Paul Crabb, associate professor of fine arts, comes to Northeast from the University of Alabama-Huntsville, where he was associate professor of music. He received his bachelor of arts in music education from Bethel College in 1976, his masters of music from

Wichita State in 1978, and his doctorate from Florida State University in 1984. Crabb has published several editions of Mozart's choral music and has had articles published in *Choral Journal* and *Update*. In addition, some of his former applied voice students have won auditions. He directs the NEMO Singers.



Johnny C. Ho, assistant professor of business administration, comes to the University from the Georgia Institute of Technology, where he was a teaching/research assistant. He received his bachelor of arts from the University of Washington in 1985, his

masters in business administration from the State University of New York at Buffalo in 1987, and his doctorate from the Georgian Institute of Technology in 1991. Ho has had articles published in *Naval Research Logistics* and the *European Journal of Operational Research*.



Huping Ling, assistant professor of Asian history, comes to Northeast from Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, where she was an instructor. She received her bachelor of arts from Shanxi University, People's Republic of China, in 1982, her master of

arts from the University of Oregon in 1987, and her doctorate from Miami University in 1991. Cody's Arrangement Recorded

Roger Cody, professor of music, received a commercial compact disk recording by the U.S. Army Brass Band which includes his arrangement of Brahms' *Geistliches Lied* as performed at the National Brass Band Competition Gala in April.

The Brahms piece was done on Cody's second commission from the Army Band. This fall he completed music for his third commission, this one to write six arrangements for the Herald Trumpets. The unit of the Army Band travels with the President, performs ceremonial duties at the White House and is featured on the Christmas at the White House television show each December. One of these pieces was played on the Fourth of July ceremony in which President Bush rededicated Mount Rushmore. Another of them was played last week at the dedication of the Reagan Library in California.

An NMSU alumnus, Captain Thomas H.

Palmatier, is the director of the Brass Band and Herald Trumpets.

The Mississippi River Brass Band, a professional group from Quincy, Ill., commissioned Cody to write a theme song for the group. The result of this commission is the *American River Quodlibet*, an arrangement which presents three American songs separately then superimposes them polyphonically. The three songs, *Ohio River Boatmen's Dance*, *Shenandoah* and *Old Man River*, thus begin as separate pieces then flow together at the end, just as the three rivers do in nature. This piece premiered Dec. 8 in Baldwin Auditorium in a joint concert by the NMSU Brass Choir and the Mississippi River Brass Band.

Geistliches Lied, the *American River Quodlibet* and another of Cody's pieces, *Bells*, are published by Bernal Music Corp. of North Carolina.

Rugby Standouts



Seven members of the NMSU Bulls Rugby Club were selected to participate in the Heart of America Rugby Football Union Collegiate/Junior (under age of 24) Select Side rugby team. The members included Paul Askeland, Jason Buschman, Chris Geisert, Dave Goring, Guy Hagen, Scott Lay and Chris Vander Pluym. The team consisted of 25 players from Kansas and north and western Missouri. Participating universities were Kansas State University, Kansas University, Pittsburg State University (Kan.) and Northeast. Other players came from rugby clubs in Kansas City and Columbia.

The Heart of America Select Side team played in the Western Collegiate/Junior Select Side championship held Nov. 30-Dec. 1 in Tulsa, Okla.
