May the best callers win!

It's down to four nights of Tel-Alumni '82 and the race is on.

Can Delta Sigma Pi overcome leads of about \$300 and \$800 by Delta Chi and Student Senate, respectively, to be the top organization for the third consecutive year?

Can Julie Moore hold on to her slim lead over Tim Boozan and others to win the \$500 scholarship awarded to the top individual caller?

Can Jeff Goldammer, who last year raised nearly \$2,000 as the top caller, rally in the final days to overtake Julie and three others whom he currently trails?

Can Tel-Alumni really reach its \$70,000 goal this year?

Well, after three weeks and about \$53,000 in pledges, the answers to these questions are still very much up in the air. Julie, Tim, Jeff and the other top callers will be manning the 30 phones in Room 3 of the Student Union Building tonight against a faculty team. The three juniors will be using their best phone techniques to vie for scholarships (\$500 to the top caller, \$250 to the second-best caller), a trip to St. Louis for two, a \$50 savings bond from Commerce Bank, two tickets to see the World Champion St. Louis Cardinals next season and \$20 in cash from Sonic. After three weeks, only about \$600 separates the top five callers.

For top caller Julie, who has pledges totaling more than \$1,600 in four nights, the numbers have added up from small contributions averaging \$15; her largest pledge was \$50. A member of Delta Zeta, the Student Activities Board, Cardinal Key and Student Ambassadors, she said, "I really wanted to call. Then after the first night, I got all psyched up for it."

She utilizes no particular technique in getting pledges, she said she just had a lot of cooperative people and no bad calls. "Rude people can be very discouraging."

Experience has played another important part in Tim's conversations since he has called for Tel-Alumni from its beginning two years ago.

"With all of the financial problems the University is having we must have projects like this. The fact that you are helping the University makes it all worthwhile."

For three hours students are talking to different people. Tim says, "I enjoy talking to alumni; it's really fun."

Best of all, the alumni enjoy talking to NMSU students like Julie. "I called one woman in Florida and asked her about the weather since I used to live in Florida. She said, 'Why don't you come down some time?' and told me to keep her phone and address and said, 'You can stay with me any time.'"

The funds raised for Project 1990 go into the University's general development fund, the 1990 version of which will be divided into several areas of student need.

Part of the amount will go toward work-scholarship programs. More students will be able to work their way through school rather than borrowing money or accepting financial aid. Additional research stipends, a means by which students work for a faculty member conducting research, and new scholarships will also be available under the program.

Faculty research and development will also be sponsored by the project. The purpose of the program is to retain the best teachers for academic programs while establishing faculty fellowships, endowed professorships and visiting professorships.

The largest portion of the money will go wherever the need is the greatest through the establishment of an unrestricted opportunity fund. Such a fund would offset any future emergencies, such as this year's budget cutback which forced NMSU to charge a \$40 surcharge next semester.

So, even though all these long range goals are important and will benefit tomorrow's NMSU students, the primary concern of Tel-Alumni right now is focused on the next few days. The Student Activities Board will face Cardinal Key on Tuesday night, Delta Chi will take on Sigma Tau Gamma on Wednesday and Delta Sigma Pi will defend its top-organization trophy on the final night against the Student Senate. The top four organizations will all receive trophies.

And, if these all-star callers and organizations hold true to form, sometime soon that \$70,000 goal will fall by the wayside. Hopefully, it won't be as dramatic as last year when the goal was reached on the very last call of the campaign!
