## Northeast's 125th: Joseph P. Blanton



The third president of the Normal College was Joseph P. Blanton, a native Virginian, born in 1849. Until age seven, he lived on a huge plantation that his father operated. It was then that Blanton's mother died, leaving his

brother, a Presbyterian pastor in Kentucky, to take Blanton under his care.

At the outbreak of the Civil War, Blanton returned to his childhood home in Virginia where he prepared for college under the instruction of private tutors. At age 15, he enrolled in Hampton Sidney College. In the spring of 1865, Blanton joined the army of North Virginia on its retreat from Petersburg to Appomattox, where Blanton was with the group when General Robert E. Lee surrendered the remnants of the Confederate Army. After this historic surrender, he returned to Virginia and reentered college where he received an A.B. degree. In 1881, he received an A.M. degree and 16 years later, he received the degree of L.L.D. conferred by Cen-

tral University of Kentucky.

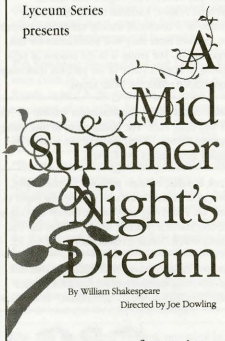
Between the times of attending school, Blanton taught in several rural schools. In 1871, he first came to Missouri to assume the chair of the Latin and Greek departments in Watson Seminary in Pike County. Following that, Blanton was elected to the presidency of Parker Seminary at Troy in Lincoln County. In 1878, he was appointed superintendent of Mexico, Mo., public schools. After successfully organizing the school systems, many looked upon Blanton as a public school figure much ahead of his time.

Following the resignation of President Baldwin and the one-year appointment of William Nason, the Board of Regents met in August of 1882 to elect a new president, and Joseph P. Blanton was placed in nomination. He was elected by a vote of three to one. He was then 33 years of age, the youngest president to serve the Normal School during his first century.

Many testimonies lead to the surmise that he was very popular with the faculty mainly because he showed interest in their general welfare and treated each of them as a colleague. Blanton was an excellent public speaker, had a good sense of humor, had a high respect for scholarship, and was widely read.

After nine years of directing the School, in 1891, Blanton left and then served as the division head for the Department of Education at the University of Missouri.

## Senegalese Film Producer to be Featured in Film Festival

As part of Missouri South Residential College's continuing International Film Festival, four films by African producer, Ousmane Sembene, will be shown in February and March.

As stated by Professor Sana Camara, a native Senegalese, Ousmane Sembene is considered the father of African film making. Born in Senegal in 1923, Sembene was a longshoreman and union organizer before teaching himself to read and write while working in France. He wrote several novels before breaking into film directing in the 1960s. He has since become the award-winning producer of six films.

Camara goes on to explain, "Due to his background as a blue-collar worker and being self-taught, his films are critiques of political leaders

who fail to bridge the gap between the educated and the not." His films often center around the conflict between these two cultures, one of modernism and one of tradition, and the economic, social and cultural problems this creates.

Along with a criticism of the system colonization created in Senegal, Camara explains, "Sembene allows the audience space to find their own solution to the problems." Camara believes that films of this nature are important for students to see because, "They're filmed from the African point of view instead of the European, therefore they show the unknown side of Africa to the West."

Keith Doubt, assistant professor of sociology and co-organizer of the event, says, "I hope to

break out of the Eurocentric theme by showing these films. All the previous films sponsored by Missouri South have been European so this is a cultural event which breaks away from that Eurocentricism." Doubt encourages people to see the films and take advantage of the chance to speak with Professor Camara following the viewing.

The films were produced in either French or Wolof but they have English subtitles. Two films, "Black Girl" and "Toussaint," will be shown Feb. 24 at 8:30 p.m. in the SUB Activities Room. The other two, "Mandabi" and "Borom Sarret," will be shown March 30 at the same time and location.
