## R. Crosby Kemper III to Present Address at Truman's Summer Commencement

R. Crosby Kemper III will deliver the commencement speech at 6:30 p.m., Aug. 6, on the Quadrangle. The commencement rain site is Baldwin Auditorium.

Approximately 95 undergraduate and 49 graduate students will be marching during the commencement ceremonies. In addition to these graduates, Truman will have seven golden alumni, who graduated from 1954 and prior, participate in the ceremony. Approximately 30 golden alumni will attend the Golden Alumni Reunion at 1 p.m. in the Student Union Building Georgian Room. A reception for all graduates will follow commencement on the Quadrangle near the flagpole.

Kemper served as the chairman and CEO of UMB Financial Corporation and UMB Bank, n.a. from 2001-2004.

Prior to that he was the chairman and CEO of UMB Bank, n.a. in Kansas City, Mo., from 2000-2001. From 1993-2000 he was the president of UMB Bank St. Louis. He held the positions of vice president, senior vice president and executive vice president at the UMB Bank in Kansas City, Mo., from 1991-1993. Kemper did independent scholarship work in New Haven, Conn., from 1990-1991. He was the executive director of the British Institute of the United States in New York from 1985-1990.



He was an English instructor at the University of Sichuan in Chengdu, China from 1983-1984. Kemper was the vice president for UMB Bank, n.a., in Kansas City, Mo., from 1977-1981.

Kemper has been a very active member of the community. He was appointed by Gov. Bob Holden to chair the blue-ribbon, Citizens Commission on the Future of Higher Education in Missouri. He also founded successful, free, outdoor Shakespeare festivals in Kansas City, Mo., and St. Louis.

He serves on the boards of many institutions. He is vice chairman of the Truman Presidential Library and Institute Board of Directors. He is on the Board of Trustees for the Kansas City Symphony and the Thomas Jefferson Foundation, the private, nonprofit corporation that has owned and operated Monticello since 1923. He has also served on the boards of the Jefferson National Park Association, Westminster College in Fulton, Mo., and Webster University in St. Louis. Kemper is an emeritus member of the Board of Commissioners of Tower Grove Park in St. Louis which is appointed by The Missouri Supreme Court.

He wrote and edited the book titled "Winston Churchill: Resolution, Defiance, Magnanimity."

Kemper received his bachelor's degree in history from Yale University.

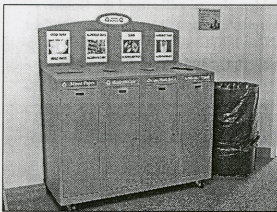
## Notes
