FACULTY NOTES ... Jim Thomas, Language and Literature, read poetry to creative writing classes Oct. 21 at the Hannibal High School. On Oct. 28 he read poems to various classes at Marceline High School....Mary Jo Murray, Health, Physical Education and Recreation, has published her first article. "Challenge Softball" appears in the Nov.-Dec. issue of Coach: Women's Athletics....Jim Barnes, Language and Literature, has four poems appearing in the current issue of Green River Review, published at University Center, Mich.
