Ballet Omaha's heartwarming production of The Nutcracker is enhanced with Tchaikovsky's magical score, breathtaking sets, glorious costumes and the sparkling choreography by Robert Vickrey, artistic director, and Robin Welch, associate ballet mistress.

The delightful story centers around Clara and her handsome prince as they battle the evil mice, encounter the dreamy Snow Queen and snow flakes in the glittering forest and are wonderfully entertained in the Kingdom of

Sweets by the Sugar Plum Fairy, Spanish and Russian dancers and Dew Drop Fairy, to name a few.

Ballet Omaha has grown and progressed to become Nebraska's only professional group of dancers, performing a full season of classical and contemporary ballet. Ballet Omaha's touring program reaches a nine-state area.

Hiring its first full-time artistic director in 1975, Ballet Omaha laid the foundation for building a professional company. In 1985, Vickrey was appointed artistic director. Vickrey, previous director of the Connecticut Ballet and former dancer with the Joffrey Ballet, is beginning his fifth season with the company.

Ballet Omaha members believe it is their responsibility to enrich the quality of life in the Midwest by cultivating an appreciation of dance and promoting artistic growth.

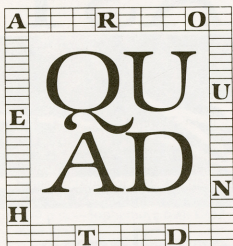
## Campus Surpasses United Way Goal

In recognition of Northeast's United Way fundraising efforts, Tom Duden and Cindy Harper, co-chairmen of the campus campaign, present a certificate to President Robert Dager at the Victory Luncheon, Nov. 14. The campus United Way campaign officially ended Oct. 31 and raised \$28,684, surpassing the \$28,200 goal.

Student donations, including the PFM United Way Food Fast, totalled \$3,093. Alpha Sigma Alpha and the International Association of Business Communicators received awards for having raised more than \$100 each during the campaign.

Faculty and staff donated more than \$11,650, with 13 divisions and offices having 100 percent participation. More than 100 people donated at least \$100, adding \$13,939 to the campaign total.





## NMSU Participates in Recruitment Database

This fall, Northeast began participating in the College Recruitment Database (CRD) program. Corporate recruiters subscribing to The Human Resource Information Network (HRIN), an on-line retrieval and communications service, are now able to view resumes of NMSU students.

Since HRIN is used by most of the Fortune 500 companies, candidates receive free national exposure to employment opportunities.

When Northeast students file their placement credentials with the Business Placement Center they choose whether or not to authorize release of their information. If a student agrees to release his or her file, the student's data sheet is automatically entered into the College Recruitment Database.

More than 11,000 colleges including Cornell University, Iowa State University, Marquette University, Purdue University and the University of Illinois, contribute to the CRD college pool.

## Goldwater Scholarship Available

To pay tribute to the leadership, courage and vision of Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, the United State Congress established an endowed recognition in his name, the Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Program.

The scholarship is designed to foster and encourage excellence in science and mathematics. Awards will be made on the basis of merit to students who will be college juniors in the 1990-91 academic year and who have outstanding potential and intend to pursue careers in mathematics and the natural sciences. To be considered, a student must be nominated by his or her college or university using the official nomination materials provided to each institution.

Each scholarship will cover eligible expenses for tuition, fees, books, and room and board, up to a maximum of \$7,000 annually. Scholarship recipi-

ents will be eligible for two years of support. Nominees for Goldwater Scholarships must include in their nomination materials a statement of interest in a career in mathematics or the natural sciences, detailing how their academic program and their overall educational plans will prepare them for their chosen career goal. It is expected that students selected as scholars will pursue advanced degrees.

To be considered for nomination as a Goldwater Scholar, a student must: plan to be a junior-level student pursuing a bachelor's degree full time during the 1990-91 academic year; have a college grade point average of at least "B" (or equivalent); and be a United States citizen.

## Van Galen Named Educator of the Year

Dean Van Galen, assistant professor of analytical chemistry, was named the 1989 Educator of the Year at a banquet, Nov. 8. The award, which was presented for the first time this year, was sponsored by Alpha Phi Sigma national honorary scholastic fraternity, the Pershing Society, Student Senate and Phi Eta Sigma freshman honorary fraternity.

Van Galen received his bachelor's from the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and his doctorate from Kansas State University. He began teaching at Northeast in 1987. He serves as the adviser for the American Chemical Society student affiliate.

The five other finalists, chosen from more than 40 nominees, were Ruth Bradshaw, instructor of foreign language; Darryl Egley, instructor of mathematics; Patrick Lecaque, assistant professor of French; Brian McGuire, assistant professor of chemistry; and Larry Stevens, assistant professor of history.

Each finalist was asked to describe his or her philosophy of teaching and most rewarding aspect of teaching. The Educator of the Year committee, composed of six members from the sponsoring organizations, also conducted confidential surveys of as many of the nominees' classes as possible.

## Rhodes, Fulbright Scholarship Nominees Selected

Four Northeast students have been nominated by the University to compete for national and international scholarships.

Senior Paul Castellani, a biology major, and senior Geoff Wyss, an English major, will compete for Rhodes Scholarships.

Castellani is a member of Pi Kappa Phi social fraternity and former tennis team member. Wyss is the editor of *Windfall*, the campus literary magazine. Both men received presidential honorary scholarships to attend Northeast.

The Rhodes Scholarship is the most prestigious international scholarship award. Thirty-two Rhodes Scholarships will be awarded in the United States this year. Each scholarship pays for two years of study at the University of Oxford in England plus an allowance of £4,860 per year.

Rhodes Scholarship awards are

based on "proven intellectual and academic achievement of a high standard, integrity of character, interest in and respect for fellow beings, the ability to lead, and the energy to use their talents to the fullest."

Senior John Kerr and senior Martin Romitti have been nominated for the Fulbright Program.

The Fulbright Program pays for one academic year of study and research in a foreign country.

The Fulbright Program was established "to enable the government of the United States to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries."

Kerr, an English major, wants to study Anglo-Saxon literature and history in England. Romitti, a political science major, wants to study the progressive political and social changes taking place in the Philippines.

**Robert Cornell**, professor of physiology, has had several articles published. "Central Administration of Interleukin 1 Elicits Hyperinsulinemia in Rats" appeared in the March issue of *American Journal of Physiology*. The article was co-authored by David Schwartz, a 1988 graduate of Northeast. Another article, "Hyperinsulinemia Elicited by Interleukin-1 and Nonlethal Endotoxemia in Rats" was published in the May issue of *Circulatory Shock*. A third article, "Central Interleukin 1-elicited hyperinsulinemia is Mediated by Prostaglandins but not Autonomics," appeared in the October issue of *American Journal of Physiology*.

**Marlow Ediger**, professor of education, received notification that his biography will appear in *The International Book of Honor* and the *International Directory of Distinguished Leadership*.
