The displays will be provided by the Blackjack Rifle & Pistol Club today; the Cannoneers on Tuesday; the Spartans on Wednesday; and the Panther Drill Team on Thursday.

A Job Fair describing the opportunities available in the military will be held from 1-3 p.m. Thursday in the Tangerine Room of the Student Union Building. On Friday, the Military Ball will be held at 6 p.m. in the Georgian Room of the Student Union Building. Featured speaker will be Maj. Gen. Marvin H. Knoll, Commander of the 102nd U.S. Army Reserve Command in St. Louis.
