"MISSOURIANS ALONG THE GREAT RIVER: Their Music, Their Changing Modes of Transportation," the second of a series of programs dealing with the history and culture of the Mississippi River, will be presented at 12:30 this afternoon at Village 76.

Dr. David C. Nichols, professor of music; and Dr. David D. March, professor emeritus of history, will be the featured speakers at the event.

The program is one of three "Programs in the Humanities," supported by a grant from the Missouri Committee for the Humanities.

TENOR LEO GOEKE and his wife, soprano Margery Ryan, will perform at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 6, in Baldwin Auditorium. They will sing selections from Schubert, Strauss, Mozart, Puccini, Stravinsky, Leoncavallo and Massenet. Goeke (B.S.E. 1957) has appeared as the leading tenor in productions of "The Barber of Seville," "The Magic Flute," "La Boheme," "Rigoletto," "La Traviata" and "Der Rosenkavalier" at the New York City Opera and Metropolitan Opera. Dr. Frederic Kirchberger, professor of music, will accompany them on the piano. Free tickets will be available to students, faculty and staff in the Student Union Office from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday and Monday and Tuesday, Feb. 5-6. The program is sponsored by the 1978-79 Lyceum Series.
