"1776," the Broadway musical that won a Tony Award and the New York Drama Critic Circle Award for best musical of the year, is coming to campus tomorrow. The action centers on John Adams and his efforts to persuade the congressional delegates to declare America free from British rule. With the help of Benjamin Franklin, he gets Thomas Jefferson to write a declaration of independence, and by compromise and cajolery, the three convince the more conservative delegates to accept the ideas in the document. Finally, on July 4, the declaration is signed.
