"Cosby Show" Consultant to Speak on Campus



Alvin Poussaint, Bill Cosby's consultant and script editor for "The Cosby Show," will discuss "Education and Multiculturalism" at 8 p.m. Nov. 1 in Pershing Arena. After his

presentation, he will entertain questions from the audience. The program is free and open to the public.

Poussaint, an associate professor of psychiatry and associate dean for student affairs at Harvard University Medical School, is also the author of the introductions in Cosby's two best-

selling books *Fatherhood* and *Time Flies*.

In addition to his Harvard appointments and his work with "The Cosby Show," Poussaint is a senior associate in psychiatry at the Judge Baker Children's Center in Boston, where he is researching grief and loss and studying interracial children. He is the author of numerous articles, and the books *Why Blacks Kill Blacks* and *Black Child Care*.

Poussaint attended Columbia University and received his medical doctorate from Cornell University in 1960. He pursued postgraduate training at the University of California-Los Angeles Neuropsychiatric Institute where he served as chief resident in psychiatry in 1964-65. At UCLA, he also pursued research in psychopharmacology.

From 1965-67, he was the southern field director of the Medical Committee for Human Rights in Jackson, Miss., where he provided medical care to civil rights workers and aided the desegregation of health facilities throughout the South. There, he worked alongside Martin Luther King Jr., Andrew Young and Jesse Jackson. He currently chairs the board of directors for PUSH/EXCEL. He is also chair of the board for the Select Committee on the Education of Black Youth.

In 1967, Poussaint joined the Tufts Medical School faculty as director of the psychiatry program in a low-income housing project. In 1969, he joined Harvard. And, in 1984, he was co-chair of Jesse Jackson's Massachusetts state campaign.

Quartet to Perform Wednesday

The Lyceum Series will present an evening of captivating chamber music Wednesday as the Amabile Piano Quartet performs in concert at 8 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium. The concert is funded in part by the Missouri Arts Council, a state agency.

The Quartet is composed of soloists Marian Hahn (piano) and Diane Monroe (violin), plus Kathleen Mattis (viola) and Lisa Lancaster (cello).

Hahn was a winner in the 1976 Leventritt Competition, which launched her distinguished solo career. As a result of winning a Pro Musicis Foundation award, Monroe has performed debut recitals in major cities across the country. For two years, she was concertmistress of the Pennsylvania Ballet Orchestra. Mattis has held the position of Associate Principal Viola in the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra since the age of 21. She is on the faculty of

the Saint Louis Conservatory and principal viola for Opera Theatre of St. Louis. Lancaster has concertized throughout the United States both as a soloist and chamber musician.

The Quartet, which has just finished a tour of three states, will perform Piano Quartet in C Major, WoO 36#3, Sonata for Violin and Piano in A minor, op. 23, and Duet "with two eyeglasses obbligato" WoO 32, all by Beethoven. Gabriel Faure's Piano Quartet in C minor, op. 15 from the Romantic period will also be featured in the program.

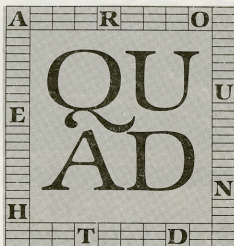
