- Lois Korslund, Head of the Division of Family Sciences, was selected chairperson of the Council of the Home Economics Administrators of Missouri at their business meeting at the recent Annual Meeting of the Missouri Home Economics Association.
- Tijuana Julian, assistant professor of music, and Paul Mosteller, assistant professor of voice, recently performed a recital of trumpet and organ music at Central United Methodist Church in Oskaloosa, Iowa.
- Beta Beta Beta Biology Honor Society was initiated as a local chapter at a ceremony March 25, becoming one of more than 320 chapters nationwide. This is the first biology honor society at NMSU.
- Senior Melanie Breaker has been nominated for the Religious Heritage of America Youth Award. The award is based on outstanding leadership in church, school and the community.
- "Aspen Highlands: Monopolization and the Duty to Cooperate," a paper by James Turner, assistant professor of accounting, was presented at the Midwest Business Administration Association.
- Marlow Ediger, professor of education, has had the following manuscripts accepted for publication: "Motivation in the Reading Curriculum" will be published in "The Education Quarterly;" "Correspondence Education" will be published in the "Australian and South Pacific External Studies Association;" "Challenge, the Student and Mathematics" will be published in the "Journal," a professional journal for mathematics teachers; and "Objectives in the Handwriting Curriculum" will be published in the "Journal of English Language Teaching," published in India. Ediger spoke at the Indiana Council for the Social Studies Convention in Terre Haute, April 10 and 11. He spoke on "The Old Order Amish" and "The Middle East."
- Richard Holt, assistant professor of economics, presented a paper on the effects of the guest-worker program under the new immigration bill on domestic agricultural workers in the United States and chaired the agriculture session at the 51st annual meeting of the Midwest Economics Association in St. Louis, March 26-28. Holt will present a paper on immigration policy at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, Aug. 26-30. He will be at the University of California-Berkeley attending and presenting a paper at a conference on "Industrial Relations in the United States." At the end of December he will present a paper at the American Economic Association conference in Chicago on the structure of the labor market in California agriculture.
