## "Good Morning Kirksville!"

Students, faculty and staff will have an opportunity to hear the famous line above when Adrian Cronauer, the man behind the movie "Good Morning Vietnam," visits the NMSU campus on Dec. 10.

In his lecture, Cronauer will tell why he went to Saigon, his experiences as a disc jockey for the troops and how the idea for the first humorous movie about Vietnam originated. Cronauer will speak at 8 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium.

Cronauer arrived in Saigon to begin his tour of duty in 1965. At that time, the U.S. presence in Vietnam was not significant and the war was not close. However, by the time his tour of duty ended a little

over a year later, the American forces were heavily involved in a no-win situation and the battle ground had moved into Saigon.

When Cronauer returned to the states, he held various jobs in broadcasting, advertising and academia. Following the success of "Good Morning Vietnam," Cronauer started touring the United States on a lecture circuit talking to people of all ages about his wartime experiences. After his hectic lecture tour ends, Cronauer will begin his third year of law school at the University of Pennsylvania.

"Good Morning Vietnam" set the all-time largest recorded gross for a non-summer or non-Christmas period.

# Board Elects New Officers



The Board of Governors elected officers for the 1989 calendar year at the Dec. 2 meeting. Elected were Secretary Frederick Lauer of Raytown, Vice President Nancy Schneider of St. Charles and President James Conway of St. Louis.

Conway succeeds Dr. Inks Franklin of Rocheport as president of the statewide board. Conway, former mayor of St. Louis, is president of ACI Plastics Inc. He was elected to the Missouri House of Representatives in 1966 and was re-elected in 1968, 1970 and 1972. He

also served in the State Senate from the sixth district until 1974. Conway was mayor of the city of St. Louis from 1977-81.

Schneider is a principal with Barklage, Barklage, Schneider, Haywood, Ehlmann and Brett Attorneys at Law in St. Charles, and a trial lawyer for the St. Charles County Juvenile Office. Lauer, recently retired from his dental practice, is owner of the Mid-America Denture Clinic in Mount Vernon.
