Professor authors study

Roy Tanner's book, "The Humor of Irony and Satire in the Tradiciones peruanas," has been published by the University of Missouri Press. Tanner is an associate professor of Spanish in the Division of Language and Literature.

The "Tradiciones peruanas" is a series of stories published in the late 19th century by Peruvian author Ricardo Palma. They are brief sketches that use irony and satire to examine details from every facet of Peruvian history, especially the intrigues and amorous escapades in colonial Lima.

Tanner's book of 192 pages provides the first comprehensive study of humor in the "Tradiciones peruanas." Tanner exhibits a keen knowledge of Peruvian linguistic patterns and idioms, and explores the interrelationship of irony, satire, humor and style in Palma's work. Through analysis and example, Tanner works toward determining the point at which Palma's humor and his historical realism merge, a point at which Palma's irony often leads not to the past, but to his contemporary Peru.
