

Carnahan names two to Board

Peter Ewell, Ph.D., senior associate for the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems (NCHEMS), and Dr. Dorothy Munch have been named to Northeast's Board of Governors by Gov. Mel Carnahan. Both appointees must be confirmed by the Missouri Senate.

"These are quality people who can help prepare the University for the 21st

Century. I'm very pleased to announce their appointments to the Northeast Board of Governors," Carnahan said.

Ewell succeeds Bill North as a non-voting out-of-state member. Munch succeeds Richard S. Pryor on the Board.

Ewell, of Boulder, Colo., first visited Northeast in 1983 as an NCHEMS consultant to evaluate the University's assessment

program. NCHEMS is a research and development center founded to improve the management effectiveness of colleges and universities. Since that time, he has assisted with Northeast's mission change plan and editing the *Five-Year Planning Document*.

Prior to joining NCHEMS in 1981, Ewell was coordinator for long-range planning at Governors State University. A

graduate of Haverford College, Ewell received his doctorate in political science from Yale University.

A 1981 graduate of Northeast and a 1985 graduate of Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine, Munch has a private practice at Poplar Bluff Family Medicine. She is a trustee of the Butler County Health Department and a staff physician with AMI Lucy Lee Hospital. ☛

Robert Archibald, president of the Missouri Historical Society, will

speak at Northeast's December commencement ceremony at 2 p.m., Dec. 17, in Pershing Arena.

Archibald has served as president of the Missouri Historical Society since 1988. He is also an associate professor of history at the University of Missouri-St. Louis.

Archibald has been teaching history for nearly 25 years at Washington University, Carroll College in Montana, Eastern Montana College, University of New Mexico, and Northern Michigan University.

Before becoming presi-

dent of the Missouri Historical Society, he worked as director of the Montana Historical Society, director of the Western Heritage Center in Montana, and curator of the Albuquerque Museum in Albuquerque, N. M. He also does consulting in non-profit organization management, program evaluation and long-range planning.

He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Northern Michigan University and his doctoral degree in museum work from the University of New Mexico. ☛

Paper copies of the Used Books List are available in the residence halls, Pickler Memorial Library and the Student Senate Office. These copies will be updated weekly and on the mainframe until Jan. 31.

Steps to Accessing the Used Book List:

1. Log on to the Music Academic System
2. At the *Go prompt, type CONF STSENATE
3. Once in the Senate file:
 - V to view the listing of books for sale
 - A to append, and add your own books
4. When adding used books for sale, include:
 - Name of book
 - Class and professor that used the book
 - Price to buy the book from your
 - Your name and phone number
5. After you sell a book, you can remove the listing from the system so you do not receive any more calls.
