The quintet is composed of virtuoso brass players who are members of the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra. The program will represent a cross-section of compositions for brass instruments written between 1597 and 1976. The anthology traces the social and cultural history of the U.S. through its music -- folk, jazz, symphonic and chamber. Half the discs will be devoted to works never before recorded.

THE BROADWAY MUSICAL, "1776," will be presented at 7 p.m. April 20 in Baldwin Auditorium. The Lyceum Series is sponsoring the musical depicting the efforts of John Adams to persuade the members of the Second Continental Congress to declare the 13 colonies independent of the British Empire.
