Gregory, Weidner Receive Lee Awards

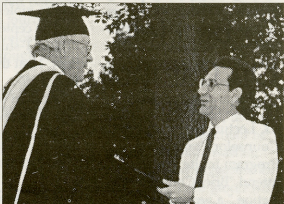
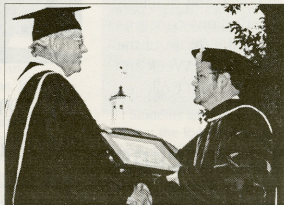
Reception Planned For Sept. 18

Five years ago, Dr. Jeanne Stephens Lee Blackmar established the William O'Donnell Lee Advising Award at Truman in memory of her late husband, William O'Donnell Lee. Lee had served as a member of the University's Board of Regents from 1971 to 1977. The award recognizes the dedication and skill of exemplary advisers and pays tribute to both past achievements and potential for future growth.

Christopher Gregory, associate college professor, and Mark Weidner, Academic Planning Services counselor, have been named this year's recipients of the Lee Awards. Gregory and Weidner each will receive a \$1,000 professional development fund. In addition, each will receive a year's membership in the National Academic Advising Association. Dawood Afzal, associate professor of chemistry, attended the Eighth International Conference on Bioinorganic Chemistry in Yokohama, Japan, July 27-Aug. 1. He presented a paper titled "Synthesis, Characterization and Selected Reactions of Yttrium and Ytterbium Porphyrin complexes." The paper was co-authored by **Russ Baughman**, professor of chemistry, and two Truman undergraduate chemistry majors, **Ben Slentz** and **Garrett Slaton**. While in Japan for the conference, Afzal hosted a reception for alumni and friends of the University at Hosei University in Tokyo. More than 45 alumni and friends attended and especially enjoyed a videotaped welcome and tour of campus by President Jack Magruder. Afzal met with members of the chemistry department at Hosei University about the possibilities of setting up a study abroad program with Truman.

Susan Barrow, associate professor of nursing, has received word that her manuscript, "Treatment Directives: When "No" is Written as a DNR," has been accepted for publication in the September-October issue of the upcoming *Missouri Nurse*.

Steven Klein, associate professor of accounting, had his article titled "Carrying Inventory Below Cost Can Create Tax Savings" published in the August 1997 issue of *Taxation For Accountants*. The magazine is published by the Research Institute of America and is read by tax practitioners. **Kathryn Kuhlman**, associate professor of English, **Ann Ellsworth**, assistant professor of English and **Amy Schlemper**, former MAE student, currently a secondary

English language arts teacher for the Linn County District, delivered papers at the "Expanding the Conversation on Reflection: Innovative Practices, New Understandings, Current Challenges" conference held in Montreal, Canada. The conference was cosponsored by the Association of Teachers of English in Quebec, The Centre for Literacy and the National Council of Teachers of English. Presenting a session titled "Making Meaning in Internships: Reflection and Self-Assessment as Ways of Knowing," the panel explored the language of interns, mentors and supervisors during MAE teaching internships and discussed its function in relation to reflection. Ellsworth reflected upon how she used questions with interns to elicit reflection and improve instructional decisions. Kuhlman examined a shared journal kept by Schlemper and her mentor during an internship and examined dialogic patterns which seemed to support a reflective stance and contribute to increased self-awareness, confidence and voice.

Following this, Schlemper offered personal insights into how the dialogue journal contributed to her growth and development through the internship and through writing the Reflective Case Study.

Bret Spainhour, director of jazz studies, performed with the Dallas Symphony Sept. 5-7 for a pops concert featuring Tommy Tune. Spainhour is a jazz saxophonist and is a new faculty member at Truman State University.

Truman State University Cheerleading Squad received a bid to the NCA National Cheerleading Competition to be held in Daytona Beach, Fla., in April. The national bid was awarded at the NCA camp at Southwest Missouri State University.

Truman State University Women's Volleyball team, coached by Becky Eggering, is a recipient of the 1996-97 American Volleyball Coaches Association Team Academic Award. This award honors teams who have matched their dedication to the sport of volleyball with dedication to excellence in the classroom. There are 932 colleges and universities affiliated with the NCAA that play women's volleyball. Only 48 receive this award; of those 48, only nine were Division II schools.
