"CRISIS AND CHANGE" is the topic of tonight's 21st Annual Baldwin Lecture scheduled for 6:30 in the Georgian Room of the Student Union Building. Dr. Henry Bamman, a 1946 NMSU graduate, will present tonight's lecture. He is currently professor of education and director of reading at California State University-Sacramento. Tickets for the lecture will be available for \$4.25 per person through 4 p.m. in the Division Offices and the Alumni Office. In addition to the lecture, a reception for Dr. Bamman will be held following the lecture. All faculty members are invited to attend and welcome Dr. Bamman back to his alma mater.

"STEPPING IN UNISON" is the theme of the spring meeting of the Northeast Missouri Teachers Association to be held on campus Friday. Speaking at the joint morning session beginning at 9 a.m. in Baldwin Auditorium will be a 1940 NMSU graduate, Dr. Paul Greene, who has served as the director of teacher education and certification of the Missouri State Department of Education since 1956. In the afternoon, 21 departmental sessions will be held. Other activities and meetings include: a program for physical education and elementary education teachers at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. in Pershing Arena entitled "Is There Another Way?" to be conducted by Ambrose Brazelton. Brazelton is currently chief of planning and coordination for the Division of Urban Education in the Ohio Department of Education; a meeting for Home Economics teachers at 11:15 a.m. in 174 Violette Hall; a meeting for Kindergarten and Early Childhood teachers at 11:15 a.m. in 240 Violette Hall; workshop displays for school librarians from 12 noon to 2:30 p.m. in the Tangerine Room of the Student Union Building; a meeting of CTA Presidents at 1:30 p.m. in 252 Violette Hall; and an all-day meeting for various FTA chapters in 12 Science Hall. Due to the teachers meeting, University classes will be dismissed on Friday.
