

Mach, Reinhard named to Board

Ruth Mach, Ed.D., elementary principal of the Clayton, Mo., school district, and James K. Reinhard, Monroe County coroner, have been named to Northeast's Board of Governors by Gov. Mel Carnahan. Both appointments must be confirmed by the Missouri Senate. Mach succeeds James "Bud" Moulder, and Reinhard succeeds Larry Rutledge on the Board.

"I'm pleased to name two outstanding new members to the Board of Governors. Ruth has a lifelong commitment to educating our young people, and Jim has dedicated himself to many years of community service. I'm confident they will do a good job," Carnahan said.

Mach received her Bachelor of Science in Education degree from Northeast Missouri State University in 1958. She went on to earn her master's degree from the University of Missouri-Columbia and her doctorate from Saint Louis University. She has received certification as an elementary school administrator, reading specialist, teacher of the learning disabled, and teacher of the behaviorally disturbed.

She has also served as elementary principal, director of reading and reading supervisor, and consultant for the

Mehlville, Mo., School District. Previously, she taught in the Affton and Lindbergh school districts in Missouri.

President of the St. Louis Suburban Principals Association, Mach is also affiliated with the National Association of Elementary School Principals, the Missouri State Principals Association, and the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development. She is past-president of Kappa Delta Pi and the International Reading Association.

Mach and her husband reside in St. Louis. They have two sons.

Reinhard operates a family-owned funeral home in Paris, Mo. He attended Westminster College and graduated from the Kentucky School of Mortuary Science.

A member of the Missouri Coroner's Association, Reinhard recently completed a five-year appointment to the State Board of Embalmers and Funeral Directors. He has also served as chairman for the State Board.

Reinhard is chairman of the Paris Planning and Zoning Commission and a member of the Paris Chamber of Commerce. He has served as president of the Paris Rotary Club and the Mark Twain Country Club. His affiliations include the Lions Club, Optimist Club, Scottish Rite, Masonic Lodge and Moolah Shrine.

Reinhard and his wife reside in Paris, Mo. They have two daughters. Reinhard is the son of Judge James R. Reinhard, who was a member of Northeast's Board of Regents from 1965-1973, serving as president from 1967-1973. ♣

Board proceeds with name change

After two years of extensive surveying, public meetings and numerous discussions with students, alumni, faculty, staff, legislators and other interested parties, the Board of Governors has voted to seek legislative approval for a new name. Via a conference call, the Board agreed that the University should proceed with a formal request to change its name to Truman State University.

"At our Dec. 9 meeting, the Board determined that support for a University name change existed; and of the top names selected, a greater interest was expressed in a version of the Truman name. Since then, representatives from the Governor's office and legislative leaders have been consulted, and they have indicated the University may

move forward with this issue," said Board President Thomas R. Shrouf Jr.

Among the reasons for changing Northeast's name, the Board cites the University's dramatic change in mission legislated in 1986 when Northeast became the statewide public liberal arts and sciences university.

The Board felt strongly about the name Truman State University since the name Truman ended up twice in the top five most favored names chosen by students, alumni, faculty, staff and other interested parties. In addition, this year marks the 50th anniversary of the presidency of Harry S. Truman, the only person to serve as president from Missouri. ♣

North Central Accreditation

Northeast's 10-year institutional accreditation visit is scheduled for Feb. 19-22. The North Central Association of Colleges and Schools' Commission on Institutions of Higher Education conducts an accreditation visit to verify the results of a member university's self-study for reaccreditation. Northeast began its year-long self-study last year with the establishment of a presidentially appointed steering committee. Subcommittees of the steering committee were created around the Commission's **Five Criteria for Accreditation**. The **Criteria** are comprehensive in nature, covering not only an institution's educational offerings, but also its governance, financial resources and the relationships that the institution makes and holds with outside communities. During the self-study process, the institution attempts to establish Patterns of Evidence to present a case that it meets the **Criteria for Accreditation**. The **Criteria**, listed at right, are newly revised this year and Northeast is among the first schools to go through the accreditation process following these newly revised **Criteria**.

The Self-Study Report

Northeast's Self-Study Report has been framed by a Self-Study Plan submitted to the Commission last year. This plan set out goals for the process focused on reexamination of and rededication to the assessment culture on campus.

Assessment is a significant part of Criterion III and is the dominant element of the Self-Study Report. Significantly, assessment is featured in every chapter of the Report. Supported by assessment data, the Report

creates a picture of the University and tracks the institution's progress over the last 10 years. The change in mission is represented as the dominant event to occur during that time period. Concerns noted in our 1984 Accreditation Team Report are addressed throughout the document and a frank discussion of current strengths and weaknesses is offered as a summary of the findings of the Self-Study. This summary is included in the concluding chapter.

The Self-Study Report and Appendix have been printed and distributed throughout campus. Copies are on reserve in the library and are available in each division office. Anyone requiring an individual copy should contact Garry Gordon, Baldwin Hall 352, 785-4271.

Discussions of the Self-Study and strengths and weaknesses identified in the report will be the focus of a University-wide meeting at 3:30 p.m. Feb. 15 in the SUB Georgian Room.

The Criteria for Accreditation

The institution has clear and publicly stated purposes consistent with its mission and appropriate to an institution of higher education.

Criterion II

The institution has effectively organized the human, financial, and physical resources necessary to accomplish its purposes.

Criterion III

The institution is accomplishing its educational and other purposes.

Criterion IV

The institution can continue to accomplish its purposes and strengthen its educational effectiveness.

Criterion V

The institution demonstrates integrity in its practices and relationships.

The Self-Study Process

More than 60 members of the faculty, administration, staff and student body worked over the course of last year to collect the data necessary to present the Patterns of Evidence required to meet each criterion.

After preliminary findings were reported within each subcommittee, the subcommittee chairs and associate chairs began to compile the data to produce written evidence that Northeast was meeting the **Criteria**. This written evidence was edited and organized into six chapters, one dealing with each of the **Criteria** plus a summary chapter that concludes the Self-Study Report by presenting the strengths and weaknesses noted in the review process. An introduction was added to outline the report. Pertinent sections of the document were circulated for review to more than 75 faculty, staff, administrators and students.

After additional editing based on this University-wide review, a draft of the document was sent to the Board of Governors. Suggestions from the Board were integrated into the Report and it was resubmitted for Board approval in December of this past year. Copies of the Self-Study Report and other accreditation materials (basic institutional data forms, current Bulletin, faculty and student handbooks) were submitted to the Commission who in turn created a team of consultant-evaluators to conduct an on-campus visit to review the findings of the Report.
