Northeast's 125th: Walter H. Ryle III



Walter Harrington Ryle III, the seventh president of Northeast Missouri State Teachers College, was born on June 1, 1896, on a small farm in Yates, Missouri. Ryle began his long life of service to the first

District Normal School in Kirksville in 1913, where he enrolled to receive his 90-hour diploma three years later. Beginning his public school career in 1916, Ryle served as high school principal in Clifton Hill, Missouri, the first of many high school administrative positions he would fill.

In 1918, Ryle took a leave of absence during service in the U.S. Army in World War I and received his military training at Camp Dodge, Iowa. Upon his return to civilian life, he reentered Northeast Missouri Teachers College to resume college work. He was awarded the Bachelor of Science in Education degree in 1919. Ryle received his Ph. D. in history from George Peabody College.

It was in 1927 that Ryle resigned as superintendent of the Public Schools of Holden to accept an appointment on the faculty of the Northeast Missouri State Teachers College to teach history and geography. He then became a professor of social science in 1930, teaching chiefly American history. While a member of the College faculty, Ryle was appointed director of the newly-established bureau of placements by President Fair. In 1934, Fair also appointed Dr. Ryle as director of the General College that was organized during the summer. Under this guidance, the Teachers College soon became one of the early leaders in the field of general education.

The Board of Regents appointed Dr. Ryle as the seventh president on August 31, 1937, eighteen days after the death of President Eugene Fair. One of the first responsibilities of President Ryle was to re-access the administrative system to meet the expanding needs of the College. Under his presidency, the fall quarter enrollment increased from 755 to 5,320 students, and the total number of individual students enrolled during the year increased from 1,858 to 7,766. With 21 newly erected buildings, the campus also grew immensely during Ryle's 30 years as president. The administration of President Ryle had been a period of growth and expansion in all phases of college life and service.

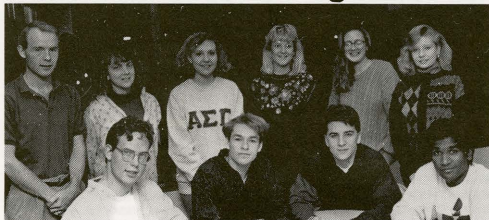

NMSU's Model United Nations delegation received the best delegation award at the 32nd annual Midwest Model United Nations Conference

in St. Louis on March 4-7. The awards are given to what conference participants feel are the five best delegations in attendance. This is the third

year in a row that NMSU has received a best delegation award.

Rob Froelich, sophomore political science major, Chris Pickett, senior pre-law political science major, Rich Lender, senior history major, and Mike Sanders '91 won best delegation on Political & Security Committee. Naomal Vidyasagara, senior computer science major, and Karin Ernst, junior economics major, received an honorable mention award for their efforts on the Economic and Finance Committee.

Seventy-five delegations, role-playing different countries with membership in the U.N., from more than 60 colleges and universities across the Midwest attended the conference. This year, NMSU represented the Islamic Republic of Iran.

NMSU's delegation preparation and participation took the form of a class, SSC1 554, advised by L. Stuart Vorhink, professor of political science, and managed by student teachers, who also acted as head delegates at the conference.

Margaret Wheatley, associate professor of management at the Marriott School of Management at Brigham Young University will present the 35th Annual Baldwin Lecture at 8 p.m. April 2 in the SUB Activities Room. Students, faculty and staff are invited to attend.

On April 3 Wheatley will present a special session for faculty on Leadership and the New Science: Applying findings from Chaos theory and quantum physics to understand our organizations. The session will be held from 8:30-11 a.m. in the SUB Georgian Room. Both the Baldwin Lecture and the special faculty session are being sponsored by the Faculty Development Committee.

Student Senate Elections

The Student Senate spring general election will be held on April 24. Any member of the student body is eligible to run provided he or she meet the criteria and follow the following procedures. The steps to running for Student Senate:

1. Investigate your options

Informational meetings will be held March 31 at 6 p.m. in SUB 2 and 3 April 1 at 7 p.m. in SUB 5 and April 6 at 6 p.m. in SUB 5. Anyone wishing further information on any office or any aspect of Student Senate is encouraged to attend. There are 34 voting members of Student Senate.

—class representatives: There are five representatives from each class, elected in the spring (freshman and graduate reps are elected in the fall). To run for this position, students must hold a 2.2 GPA, be a member for that class by the beginning of the fall semester and file a petition signed by 75 members of the class with the Student Senate Councilperson-at-large.

—representatives-at-large: There are eight representative-at-large positions on Student Senate. To run for this position, a student

must hold a 2.2 GPA and file a petition signed by 150 members of the student body with the Student Senate Councilperson-at-large.

—executive officers: The executive committee consists of the president, vice president, secretary treasurer and councilperson-at-large. To run for any of these offices a student must hold a 2.5 GPA and file a petition signed by 150 members of the Student body with the Student Senate Councilperson-at-large.

2. Get your name on the ballot

Candidates may pick up a petition for office from the Senate Information Desk in the SUB between April 1 and 13. Completed petitions may be turned in after 9:30 a.m. April 1 but must be turned in before 5 p.m. April 13 at the Information Desk. Names will be on the ballot in the order in which petitions are received.

3. Campaign

Campaigning starts at 5:01 p.m. on April 13. Campaign regulations will be available with petitions at the Student Senate Information Desk.
