FALL SEMESTER FRESHMEN are required to participate in the Freshman Testing Program on Thursday, Nov. 3. Testing will begin promptly at 1:30 p.m. Students who enrolled in classes for the first time at NMSU this semester or during the last summer session of this past summer are required to take the tests. The testing schedule will appear in Thursday's Index. Students required to take the test are to be excused from scheduled classes and other activities during the testing period. The freshman tests are referred to on page 42 of the 1977-79 General Bulletin under "Required Tests." The test results will be used by academic advisors and others to measure present levels of achievement and later to measure progress toward educational goals at NMSU.

THE ROTC DIVISION is offering a new course at no charge to students. The course is designed to enable students who cannot enroll in the basic Military Science program because of schedule conflicts to earn equivalent credit for it. This "equivalent credit" is designed to keep the student's options open to go on in the Advanced ROTC Program and to earn an officer's commission in the U.S. Army. The course is not offered for academic credit. Areas of instruction offered are mountaineering, marksmanship, U.S. Army weapons, survival techniques, orienteerings, physical conditioning, first aid, combatives, backpacking, and tactical training.
