Board of Governors Elects Officers, Approves Tuition Increase

James K. Reinhard was elected president of the Truman State University Board of Governors at the Feb. 6 meeting on campus. Ruth Mach and Maria L. Evans were elected vice president and secretary, respectively.

Reinhard is the owner and operator of the Agnew Funeral Home in Paris, Mo., where he resides with his wife Pam and their two daughters. He attended Westminster College and graduated from the Kentucky School of Mortuary Science in 1977. He has served as coroner of Monroe County since 1984. In 1994, he completed a five-year term on the State Board of Embalmers and Funeral Directors, having served as its chairman. In addition, he has been president of District 3 of the Missouri Funeral Directors Association, president of the Mark Twain Country Club and the Paris Rotary Club, and a member of the advisory board of Hannibal's St. Elizabeth Hospital. He is presently the court appointed trustee of the Dulaney Library Trust Fund, chairman of the Paris Zoning Commission and a member of the Paris National Bank's advisory board and Paris Lion's Club. Reinhard was appointed to Truman's Board in 1995.

Mach is the principal at Meramec Elementary School in the Clayton, Mo., School District. A 1958 graduate of Truman, Mach earned her master's degree from the University of Missouri-Columbia and her doctorate from Saint Louis University. She has served as elementary principal for the Mehlville School District, and she previously taught in the Affton and Lindbergh

school districts in Missouri. Mach was appointed to the Board in 1995.

Evans is a 1981 graduate of Truman. She is an assistant professor of pathology at University Hospital and Clinics in Columbia, Mo. She is also a diplomate of The American Board of Pathology in combined Anatomic Pathology and Clinical Pathology. She received her medical degree from the University of Missouri-Columbia in 1991. Prior to medical school, she taught science at Rector, Ark., High School. She was appointed to the Board in 1995.

At the meeting, the Board approved a 4 percent increase in tuition and 5 percent room and board increase for Missouri students. In-state tuition will be \$3,544; out-of-state tuition, \$6,344. Room and board costs for 1999-2000 will be \$4,400.

In other action, the Board voted to provide complete networking for all residence halls next year. The networking will allow students to link to the University's computer system without using a dial-up connection.

Rock & Roll Pianist To Perform Feb. 14

The "Father of Rock & Roll Piano," **Johnnie Johnson**, will perform in Baldwin Auditorium on Feb. 14. Johnson launched his career in music in 1942 while playing with celebrities like Bob Hope and Betty Hutton during his military service in the South Pacific Marshall Islands. He then played in Detroit and Chicago with other musical greats such as Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf, and Memphis Slim.



In 1952, Johnson moved to St. Louis and hired an "unknown" saxophonist named Chuck Berry. The two toured together for 18 years and continue to play together today. Johnson has been touring with his own group for the past 10 years. In 1988,

Johnson was recognized for his contribution to Rock & Roll in the rockumentary "Hail Hail Rock & Roll."

Johnson's piano work and musical arrangement is featured in many of Berry's hits including "Maybellene," "Back in the U.S.A.," "Roll Over Beethoven," "Sweet Little Sixteen," and Berry's tribute to Johnson, "Johnny B. Goode."

Special guest Deadwood will perform the opening act along with Johnson and Aaron Ralston. The event begins at 7 p.m. and admission is free to the public. KTRM 88.7 FM., The Edge, is co-sponsoring the event with the Student Activities Board, Funds Allotment Council and the Truman Residential Living Office. Tickets are available at the SAB Office or at KTRM, both located on the lower level of the Student Union.

Program Seeks Applicants

Due to the excellent achievements of last year's participants, the Sue Shear Institute for Women in Public Life at the University of Missouri-St. Louis has requested applications from Truman students for this year's 21st Century Leadership Training Program. This week-long residential program encourages Missouri college women to consider careers in public policy, emphasizes leadership skills and provides mentoring opportunities for college women leaders regardless of their major. Past program graduates have played key roles in campaigns, have worked in legislative offices, covered the governmental beat for city newspapers and organized campus political groups. The goal of the program is not only to get women represented in government, but to have them make a difference once they get there.

This year's Leadership Training will take place on the UM-St. Louis campus from May 23-28, 1999. Four students will be chosen from each of only nine Missouri institutions. Participants may be undergraduate or graduate students, but should be planning on spending another year on campus and have demonstrated leadership capability and interest in public policy.
