PRESIDENT McCLAIN received the U.S. Army Second ROTC Region Certificate of Achievement from Brig. Gen. James M. Leslie Wednesday for his outstanding civilian service. McClain was cited for "his hours of personal time attending and speaking at official Military Science functions" and for "the excellent relations fostered by him between the civilian and military communities."

Under the President's leadership, the University has maintained the largest ROTC enrollment in the state and one of the largest in the nation. This year the enrollment of sophomores and juniors has more than doubled.

Leslie is commander of the Second ROTC Region which includes an eight-state area.

**CIVILIAN JOBS FOR ROTC GRADS ...** Students who enroll for the \$100 per month ROTC program will no longer face the obligation to serve in the active Army. Under an option just announced, a limited number of vacancies are now available on a first-come, first-serve basis for students who prefer to go directly into civilian jobs, according to Col. Murray Williams, head of the Military Science Division.

In return for the \$100 per month a student receives, he agrees to become an officer after graduation in one of the reserve outfits in the vicinity of his civilian job. For one weekend per month, the Reserve Guard officer would initially receive approximately \$100 monthly. For more information contact the Military Science Division, Nason Hall.
