Lyceum Presents Quartet Seraphin



Quartet Seraphin will perform at 8 p.m., Oct. 16 in Baldwin Auditorium as part of the 1990-91 Lyceum Series. Free tickets for students, faculty and staff for the Quartet Seraphin will be available in the Student Activities Office, SUB, beginning Oct. 10. Financial assistance for this performance has been provided by the Missouri Arts Council, a state agency. The use of cameras and recording equipment during the performance will be prohibited.

The St. Louis-based group will play Beethoven's Quartet in A Major, Opus 18, No. 5, Stravinsky's Concerto for String Quartet, and Brahms' Quartet in A Minor, Opus 51, No. 2.

Quartet Seraphin has received much critical acclaim since its formation in 1983. The Quartet has performed classical music in concert halls, churches and art galleries in St. Louis, and, in 1987, began a concert series in Sheldon Memorial. The group has also presented music programs for students through their association with the St. Louis chapter of Young Audiences, Inc.

The four women who comprise the group are violinists Wanda Becker and Rose Martin, violist Sara Pandolfi, and cellist Mary Lou Gotman.

Becker, first violinist, has been a member of the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, the Tibor Varga Chamber Orchestra in Germany and the Winnepeg

Symphony. She has been a member of the Rarely Performed Music Ensemble, the principal violinist of the American Kantorei and a recitalist for the Canadian Broadcast Corporation.

Second violinist Martin has been an active chamber music performer throughout the south and midwest and has presented hundreds of concerts for children.

Pandolfi has been playing chamber music since she was 12 years old. A

former member of the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, she has also played with Opera Theatre of St. Louis, the American Kantorei, and the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra. Gorman has an extensive background in music education and performance. She is a former member of the Richmond Symphony Orchestra and Trio Pro Viva and presently teaches cello and conducts the String Training Orchestra at the St. Louis Conservatory and Schools for the Arts.

Forensic Team Debate

The Northeast Forensics Team will host a debate team from Great Britain this week.

The teams will debate "The House Would Give Ireland Back to the Irish" (phrased in British Parliamentary style). The debate will be held at 5 p.m., Oct. 11, in Violette Hall 121.

Great Britain will be represented by Andrew McKie of the University of Glasgow and Judith Barnes of Oxford University in Princeton. Barnes has twice represented Oxford in six states on North American tours. Their appearance at Northeast will be one of less than 30 American debates. Northeast will be

represented by Erik Hansen, a senior political science major, and Scott Smith, a junior pre-law history major. The Northeast team was the 1989 Missouri State Champion in Debate.

The debate will be monitored by John Hart, director of forensics. A panel of judges familiar with debate and Irish history will determine the winner of the contest.

This is the second time an international debate team has appeared on this campus. Last spring, a team from Japan debated Northeast on U.S.-Japan trade policies.

Faculty Present Chamber Music

The recital will feature Melissa Rose, assistant professor of music at Northeast. Hal Grossman, assistant professor of violin at Miami University of Ohio and Kelly Burke, assistant professor of clarinet at the University of North Carolina-Greensboro.

Rose has performed chamber music recitals and gave master classes in accompanying at the University of Tennessee-Knoxville and the University of North Carolina-Greensboro. She performed with the Artusi Trio at Indiana State

University and Murray State University in April. She received her bachelor's in music from West Chester University, her master's in music from Yale University and her doctorate from the University of Michigan. She has been teaching at Northeast since 1988.

Grossman, holds performance degrees from the University of Michigan and the Eastman School of Music. A first prize winner in the International Cleveland Quartet Competition and the National Fishcoff Chamber Music Competition, Grossman has performed as a recitalist and chamber musician throughout North America and Europe. Since his successful Carnegie Hall debut with the Casella String Quartet, he has also been heard in

concert with such artists as flutist Julius Baker, pianist Frank Glazer, the Chester String Quartet and the New York Chamber Ensemble. As concerto soloist, he has performed with numerous orchestras including the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra and the North Carolina Symphony.

Burke holds the Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from the Eastman School of Music and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Michigan. Burke has performed with the Toledo Symphony, South Bend Symphony, North Carolina Symphony, the Opera Festival Orchestra of Heidelberg, West Germany and currently plays principal clarinet with the Greensboro Symphony.
