Lyric to Perform Puccini's *La Bohème*

The Lyceum Series will present one of the best-loved Italian operas of today as the Lyric Opera of Kansas City performs *La Bohème* at 8 p.m., Oct. 9, in Baldwin Auditorium. Tickets will be available Oct. 3-5 and 9 in the Student Activities Office, SUB. Financial assistance for this performance has been provided by the Missouri Arts Council, a state agency.

The use of cameras and recording equipment during the performance will be prohibited.

Set in the colorful Latin Quarter of Paris, *La Bohème* is the deeply romantic love story of Rodolfo, a poet, and Mimì, a seamstress. The brilliant, familiar music of Puccini and the romantic plot work together to provide an evening of exciting music theater. The production will be conducted by Russell Patterson, the Lyric's founder and general artistic director, and directed by Francis Cullinan.

La Bohème is a classic tragic romance. The young seamstress meets the poet on a cold winter evening. They are immediately drawn to each other

and fall in love. However, they fall too deeply in love and decide they must separate. The couple is reunited at the young woman's death bed.

Under the baton of Patterson, the Lyric Opera of Kansas City has toured for 25 years, making it the oldest touring program in the Midwest.

Founded in 1958 by Patterson, the Lyric Opera has been dedicated to producing opera as "theater with the added dimension of music," and using talented

American singers, directors and designers in their productions.

The Lyric is a major musical organization ranked among the 15 leading opera companies in the United States. Performing exclusively in English, the Lyric Opera annually presents two repertory seasons of five operas. In addition, the Lyric tours surrounding states after its regular season and is an active participant in the Missouri River Festival of the Arts.
