BOB WELCH with Dudek, Finnegan and Krueger will perform at the Spring Concert sponsored by the Student Activities Board. Welch's record album, "French Kiss," has sold almost a million copies in the United States and is platinum in Canada. Performances will be given at 7 and 10 p.m. Saturday in Baldwin Auditorium. "LINCOLN AND HIS INTERPRETERS," a history symposium which concludes the Schwengel-Lincoln Collection Dedication Ceremonies, will be held at 7 tonight in Baldwin Auditorium. The program will feature three well-known Lincoln historians including Lavern M. Hamand, professor of history, Eastern Illinois University; Robert W. Johannsen, J.G. Randall Distinguished Professor of History, University of Illinois; and Wayne C. Temple, deputy director, Illinois State Archives. Everyone is invited to attend.

During the reception at 3:30 p.m., Greek Week T-shirts will be presented to University President Charles J. McClain; Terry Smith, dean of students; Vonnie Nichols, director of student activities; and to Mike Kacir, InterFraternity Council sponsor. Tuesday night at 8, the movie "Fraternity Row" will be shown in Baldwin Auditorium. Admission is \$1.

The Greek Olympics are scheduled for 5 p.m. Wednesday at Stokes Stadium. Fraternity and sorority members will team up for competitive events such as a car cram, zip and strip race, tricycle race, baby bottle chugging and a chariot race.
