THE SECOND MIDWESTERN CONFERENCE FOR WRITING PROGRAM ADMINISTRATORS will be hosted by NMSU on Saturday on the third floor of the Administration/Humanities Building. Guest speakers will be Professor William Irmischer of the University of Washington and Professor Elizabeth Wooton Cowan of Texas A & M. Dr. Irmischer will discuss "Teaching Writing: Things That Get in the Way" at 10 a.m. in the Little Theatre of Baldwin Hall. Dr. Cowan will relate industrial management theory to the teaching of writing at 3:30 p.m. in the Little Theatre. The conference will be directed by Dr. Shirley Morahan, assistant professor of English. It is supported by a grant from the Missouri Committee for the Humanities, the state-based arm of the National Endowment for the Humanities.
