CHANGES IN FINANCIAL AID policy have been made recently. As of October 1, the interest rate on the National Direct Student Loan increases from four to five percent. The Guaranteed Student Loan now is need-based if family adjusted gross income exceeds \$30,000—there is a five percent "origination fee" that is deducted first from the loan amount. Allocations for NDSL and Work-Study have not been increased, so many students will have to contribute slightly more of their own resources toward fees, room and board, and not all students who request Work-Study will receive it. Changes in the Pell Grant (formerly BEOG) do not affect NMSU students.

Scholarships that were formerly fee-waivers are now valued at \$300—these include new and renewal Regents, Certificates of Recognition and Community College Scholarships.

A complete financial aid/scholarship brochure for the 1982-83 school year will be available from University literature racks, Financial Aids or Admissions in a few weeks.
