A GENERAL FACULTY MEETING is scheduled for 4 p.m. Oct. 4 in 106 Laughlin Building.

SESAME STREET'S 'SUSAN' will be the keynote speaker at this Friday's meeting of the Northeast Missouri Teachers Association on campus.

The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. with a general session in Baldwin Auditorium. The theme for the day is "The Classroom--Laboratory of Life."

Dr. Loretta Long, known on-camera as "Susan," has appeared as one of the hosts on the award-winning "Sesame Street" tv program since the show began. She received a doctorate degree in education from the University of Massachusetts in 1973 and is a sought-after lecturer in the field of children's education and the dynamics of television on the education of young children.

A number of University faculty and staff members will lead discussions during the afternoon departmental programs including Don Coleman, Education; Jerry Mayhew, Health and Physical Education; Roger Cody, Fine Arts; Charles Elam, Extension and Placements; Ollin Drennan, Science; Bill Kitts, Social Science; and G. H. Jamison, Mathematics.

"TO BE OR NOT TO BE" is the topic for Kirksville's second in a series of town meetings scheduled for 7-9 p.m. tonight in the Community Room of the First National Bank. Harold Haas, city planner from Springfield, Mo., will be the keynote speaker.

The town meetings are being funded by a grant from the Missouri Committee for the Humanities.

"THE TOUCH," a film about marriage, will be shown tonight at 9:30 p.m. at the Kennedy Theater. All seats are \$1.

FACULTY TAX DEDUCTIONS FOR HOME OFFICES may soon be a thing of the past. This week's Chronicle of Higher Education reports that tax provisions which have permitted professors to deduct the expenses of office space in their homes were eliminated in the tax-reform bill of 1976. The bill was placed before Congress last week by a House and Senate conference committee.

Rulings by the Internal Revenue Service in 1963 and 1964 established the legality of faculty members taking deductions for home office space if the home office was used for work on research or publications.

If the bill passes (it'll be effective last Jan. 1) such deductions will be allowed only if part of the taxpayer's home is used solely and regularly as his or her principal place of business or as a place to meet clients.

Another provision of the bill limits deductions for expenses of attending conventions in other countries to only two overseas conventions per year and limits the deductions to the equivalent of the daily allowance granted to U.S. government employees in the same areas.

LEON KAREL AND JAMES PAULDING are the project directors for a grant from the Missouri Committee for the Humanities which will help finance the first general session of the National Association for Humanities Education Biennial Convention Oct. 14-16 in St. Louis. John Goodlad, dean of education at UCLA, will be the keynote speaker for the session which will deal with "American Education--A Humanistic Perspective." Seven humanists, including Karel and Paulding, will be panelists for the discussion. More than 1,000 teachers are expected to attend the convention.

He practiced law until entering p.r. work in 1959. In 1972 he became a hymnist and since then has written Christmas carols, guitar ballads, rock ballads and sonnets. WHO'S NEW? For the past 26 years, Joseph Underwood, visiting professor of education, has directed the instructional program of the Lee's Summit schools. He and his wife Glenda have three children and two grandchildren.

Robert Rhoades, assistant professor of anthropology, is currently studying the phenomenon of return migration from West Germany and Spain through the sponsorship of the Ford and Rockefeller Population Research Program. He received a B.A. in sociology from Oklahoma State University in 1966, an M.A. in sociology from the University of Hawaii in 1968, and a Ph.D. in anthropology last May from the University of Oklahoma. He taught at Phillips University, the University of Maryland and the University of Oklahoma before coming here. His wife's name is Vera.
