## Northeast Receives Philatelic Souvenir



A souvenir envelope was anonymously assembled and donated in honor of the 125th anniversary of NMSU. The postmark date of Sept. 2 coincides exactly with the school's very first day of classes in 1867 as well as the 1992 celebration date. The souvenir is on dis-

play in President Warren's office, McClain Hall 200, and will later be displayed in the library.

Quite a number of stamps issued over the years by the United States have themes which have ties to the University. This confirms the importance of the activities in which the University is engaged. A key giving the envelope layout and an indication of the relationship is displayed with the envelope. While all areas have not been directly honored by having stamps issued by the United States Postal Service, it was the intention of the assembler of this envelope to note as many "connections" as possible. Perhaps there are other philatelic connections that were inadvertently omitted, or will be issued after 1992, that someone will include for the 150th anniversary.

## Northeast's 125th: Lyceum Series

What do Eleanor Roosevelt, Vincent Price, Helen Keller, the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra, and former President William Howard Taft have in common? They have all taken part in the Lyceum programs presented throughout the years at Northeast Missouri State University.

Today, the programs are called the Lyceum Series. The word lyceum is of Greek origin meaning, "an organization sponsoring such presentations as lectures and concerts." The programs are for education, culture and entertainment according to Gilbert Kohlenberg, professor emeritus of history, who served as chairman of the Lyceum Series for 31 years.

Although the Lyceum Series of the present time was established in 1960, the type of cultural program which it offers is much older. The first such cultural programs were presented in 1899 under the auspices of the

Young Men's Christian Association. It was in that year that John R. Kirk became president of the college and he highly favored the Lyceum Lecture Course as the programs were called. Although a lecture course, the series also featured music and drama.

Currently, James Shaddy, professor of ecology, chairs the Lyceum committee. Six other faculty and staff persons are appointed to the committee every year by the President. The student members are the president and vice president of the Student Activities Board.

Still to come for this year's Lyceum Series: Smoke on the Mountain featuring the Arkansas Repertory Theatre, Oct. 22; The Kansas City Symphony, Nov. 19; Amahl and the Night Visitors, Nov. 23; Al Eaton, Jan. 18; Pickle Family Circus, Feb. 15 and 16; Steel Magnolias, March 3; and the State Ballet of Missouri, March 23.

## Northeast Graduate Program Receives Grant

Northeast has received a grant award from the U.S. Department of Education for the Ronald E. McNair Post-Baccalaureate Achievement Program. The purpose of the program is to prepare low-income, first-generation college students, and students from other groups underrepresented in graduate education, for doctoral study.

The program would involve faculty tutoring students, giving seminars, counseling and advising, and an opportunity for a financed summer research experience. This is a cooperative program with the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine—with Northeast serving as the administrative body. The total annual funding is \$140,000 each year for three years.

Any student who has completed the freshman year may apply. Applications will be available Oct. 14 in the Minority Services Office, McClain Hall 103.

## 1993 United Way Drive

*Northeast Today* is highlighting all agencies funded by the United Way Drive which began on Oct. 1. Featured this week are Sheltered Workshop and Kirkville Day Care Center.

**Sheltered Workshop** (Community Opportunities, Inc.) provides meaningful employment to the handicapped adults in the community who are unable to compete in the open labor market because of their disabilities. They serve ages 21 to 65 and older, male and female. In 1991, they employed 75 handicapped persons and will employ more as they acquire more space. The program has been in operation since 1969 and has been an agency of United Way of Adair County since 1970.

**Kirkville Day Care Center** provides quality care in a loving environment for more than 90 children daily in our community, from ages 2 through 12 years old. In addition to preschool children, they bus kindergartners to the Center for an extra half day enrichment program and provide after school care for "Latch Key Kids." It has been in operation since 1972 and has been an agency of United Way of Adair County since 1975.

## Lyceum Series Presents Smoke On The Mountain



Smoke On The Mountain, the new bluegrass gospel musical comedy on tour from Arkansas Repertory Theatre, comes to Northeast Missouri State University on Oct. 22 for a performance in Baldwin Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. The performance is sponsored by the NMSU Lyceum Series. Free tickets for students, faculty and staff will be available beginning Oct. 16 in the Student Activities Board Office, SUB.

Welcome to Mount Pleasant, the pickle capital of North Carolina, and the Sanctified Sanders Family Singers are in some kind of pickle. The year is 1938 during the waning years of the Great Depression. After a five-

year hiatus, the Sanders Family is late for their first Saturday Night Sing in Mount Pleasant's tiny Baptist church.

The Rev. Mervin Oglethorpe, who hopes to bring Mount Pleasant into the modern era, entertains the congregation until the Sanders finally arrive. With all manner of instruments in guitars, banjo, mandolin, autoharp, washboards, harmonicas, and accordions, to name a few—the Sanders Family present a not-so-standard Saturday Night Sing, celebrating oldtime religion in song, testimonials, and lots of laughter.

The Sanders Family is comprised of Vera and Burl (mother and father), daughter June (who signs for the deaf and plays percussion), 17-year old twins Dennis and Denise, and Uncle Stanley (Burl's blacksheep brother). Led by the Rev. Oglethorpe, the family provides a raucous, foot-stomping, bluegrass musical portrait of the rural South at a time when organized religion had found its heyday and could still move mountains.

Originator Alan Bailey directs Smoke On The Mountain, which was written by Connie Ray (of "The Torkelsons" fame), with musical arrangements by Mike Craver and Mark Hardwich, who created "Pump Boys And Dinettes" and "Oil City Symphony." Smoke On The Mountain is produced in association with the Lamb's Theatre in New York, which is owned and operated by the Manhattan Church of the Nazarene. This is a Mid-America Arts Alliance performance.

## Gubernatorial Teleconference

On Oct. 14 at 7 p.m. Northeast will be one of approximately 70 sites in Missouri participating in the live, interactive teleconference titled "1992 Community Issues Forum."

The teleconference is being organized by the Community Issues Coalition. The coalition is an organization formed of nine independent agencies and groups that have an interest in strengthening communities.

Featured in the teleconference are gubernatorial candidates William Webster and Mel Carnahan. Webster is a republican from

Carthage, Mo., and is currently serving his second term as attorney general. He is a former state representative. Carnahan is a democrat from Rolla, Mo., and he is currently serving as lieutenant governor. He is a former state treasurer and state representative.

Issues to be discussed are health care availability, education, mental health, community challenges, and homelessness. The coalition invites all Missourians to participate in the teleconference which will be held in the SUB Activities Room.

## Franklin Under Construction

Construction will begin on Franklin Street between the Student Union Building and Centennial Hall on Oct. 19. The construction is being done in order to finish the replacement of the steamline to Centennial Hall.

Assistant Campus Planner Mark Myer, says that two lanes of traffic must be main-

tained at all times but that it might affect traffic and parking along that stretch of Franklin Street.

The construction is expected to take approximately two weeks and the work will be done in east-to-west fashion. Therefore, work will begin on the SUB-side of Franklin Street.

# Athletic Hall of Fame

Northeast's annual Athletic Hall of Fame induction will be held Oct. 17, honoring 11 new inductees. These Northeast alumni will be recognized at the home football game against Northwest Missouri State University, as well as at the banquet and formal induction ceremony hosted by the NMSU Alumni Association that evening at 6:30 p.m. in the SUB Georgian Room.

Since the creation of the Athletic Hall of Fame in 1983, 111 members have been inducted. The Hall of Fame was founded by Northeast alumni who recognized outstanding contributors to the athletic program. One of the charter members of the Hall of Fame and past Bulldog football coach, Don Faurot, will be the guest speaker at the formal induction ceremony.

Faurot is a native of Missouri and a 1925 graduate of the University of Missouri, Columbia, receiving his master's in 1927. As a collegiate, he lettered in football, basketball, and baseball.

Faurot was the Bulldog football coach from 1926-34, during which his teams were MIAA champions seven times and compiled an overall record of 63-13-3 which is the best winning percentage for any Bulldog football team before or since.

Faurot also coached successful basketball, track, and baseball teams while at Northeast. His basketball team winning the MIAA championship in 1926-27.

Upon leaving Northeast in 1934, he began a career as the head football coach, from 1935-56, and athletic director at the University of Missouri-Columbia. Among his many other honors, Mizou's football field was named for him in 1972. He has also been inducted into the National Football Hall of Fame and the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame.

The 1992 inductees and their biographies follow.

**Kenneth Bebermeyer** played four years of football, earning all-conference laurels three years. He collected honorable mention All-American recognition and helped his team capture league championships in 1969 and 1970. He's currently vice president and general manager of Ernest Hazel Inc.

**Dr. Frank L. Bigsby, Jr.** played three years of basketball and one season in football and tennis between 1927-30. He was all-conference in football in 1929, helping his team notch an MIAA championship. He also led the basketball team in scoring and won the state doubles tennis championship. After practicing medicine for 40 years, he retired in the mid-1970s.

**Carol Jarrard Enfield** is the first woman to be inducted into Northeast's Hall of Fame. She is the only women's basketball player

ever to receive All-American first-team honors (1981-82). She helped the team win the 1981-82 MALAW title and still owns 19 school records. She's currently the activity coordinator of a retirement home in Washington, Iowa.

**T.J. Jackson** played football between 1962-65, twice helping the team win the conference championship. In 1965, he was selected for the second all-MIAA team. He's currently an agent for State Farm Insurance Company.

**G.H. Jamison** was a former mathematics instructor at the University and served on the University's athletic committee from 1920 to the early 1960s. He was an NMSU faculty representative to the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association, served as MIAA secretary, kept statistics for Northeast and the MIAA, and supervised Northeast's athletic budget. He died in 1979.

**Jerome Meyer** lettered four years in football between 1965-69, earning all-MIAA recognition twice. He also played baseball two years. He's currently teaching health and physical education in the Kirksville School District and is a volunteer football coach at Northeast.

**Ralph Sterrett** played four years on the basketball team between 1957-61, capturing all-conference recognition and helping the team win a conference championship in 1959-60. He's a member of the Illinois Basketball Hall of Fame. He's currently the athletic director at Streator High School, Streator, Ill.

**Lowell Wade** played football between 1929-32, helping the team capture three conference titles. He coached high school football and was a member of the Missouri State Highway Patrol. He died in 1970.

**Robert Watts** played football between 1959-62, helping the team notch two conference crowns. He was also a member of the track team, setting two school records and one league mark. In 1968, he was killed in action in VietNam while serving in the Army.

**Paul Whalen** played basketball between 1941-42 and 1945-48, including two conference championship teams. He captured honorable mention MIAA laurels in 1941-42. He was chosen for the All-American team at the National AAU Tournament. He's currently the manager of Lauderhill National Self Storage.

**David Winslow** played basketball between 1977-81 and earned All-American honors. He helped the team win the MIAA title and held the Bulldog career scoring record until 1990-91. He played professional basketball in the Australian National League and is currently project manager for the University City School District.
