FALL SEMESTER FRESHMEN are required to participate in the Freshman Testing Program on Thursday, Nov. 3. Testing will begin promptly at 1:30 p.m. Students who enrolled in classes for the first time at NMSU this semester or during the last summer session of this past summer are required to take the tests. The testing schedule will appear in today's Index and next Thursday's Index. Students required to take the test are to be excused from scheduled classes and other activities during the testing period. The freshman tests are referred to on page 42 of the 1977-79 General Bulletin under "Required Tests." The test results will be used by academic advisors and others to measure present levels of achievement and later to measure progress toward educational goals at NMSU.

A SPECIAL ELECTION to fill the position of Councilperson-at-large for Student Senate will be held on Friday, Oct. 28. THE UNITED WAY STUDENT CAMPAIGN begins today. The goal is \$1,300, which is 25 cents per student. United Way also is sponsoring a contest with competition in two categories. The first competition is between residence halls, Interfraternity Council and Panhellenic Council. A second category of competition is between campus organizations. All money intended for competition must be turned into Director of Student Activities, Administration/ Humanities Building 204 by 3 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 26.
