

Voting Notes

Following are instructions for voting on Nov. 8.

1. Bring a photo ID that bears your signature on it. A driver's license (from any state) or a social security card is acceptable. An NMSU student ID is NOT acceptable, since it does not have your signature.

2. Plan your schedule to anticipate long lines at the polling place. Polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.

3. Students living in **Dobson, Blanton, Nason, Brewer, Missouri and Centennial halls and Randolph Apartments** should report to Greenwood School for voting.

Greenwood School is located at the corner of Normal and Halliburton streets, just north of the Newman Center and Missouri Hall.

4. Students living in **Ryle and Grim halls and Fair and Campbell apartments** should report to Benton School for voting.

Benton School is located at the corner of Patterson and First streets, just west of Grim-Smith Hospital.

5. Off-campus students should report to the polling place indicated in the letter you received from the County Clerk's office after registering. If you have not received a letter from the Clerk's office by Nov. 4, call the Clerk's office at 665-3350 to find out where you should vote. ☺

Bethel To Direct Regional Center

David Bethel, acting associate vice president for academic affairs, has been named interim director of the Northeast Missouri Regional Center for Teacher Development. The appointment was announced by Lanny Morley, vice president for academic affairs, and Patricia Miller, head of the Division of Education and principal writer of the grant from the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) that supports the Center.

Bethel will continue his duties in the Vice President's Office one-half time, retaining the responsibilities which relate primarily to the support of faculty and teaching, including academic space and academic budgeting.

The Regional Center will coordinate efforts of DESE and local school districts in the accomplishment of the "Outstanding Schools Act" of 1993. According to Morley and Miller, Bethel was selected as interim director for the project because of his background in public schools of Northeast Missouri and his interest in the project. A search for a permanent director will occur in spring 1995.

As a result of Bethel's new assignment, a plan to reorganize the duties of the associate vice president has been developed. Alanna Preussner, associate vice president, who oversees the Residential Colleges, will have responsibilities for most services and programs that relate to the support of students and learning. Preussner will oversee Academic Planning Services, academic suspension and probation, Center for International Education Abroad, academic internships, study skills program, University Speaker Series, Upward Bound, 1000 Hills Summer Camps, Center for Service-Learning, Commuter College, and undergraduate research.

Morley will assume the duties of the graduate dean and will work with the Graduate Council. A bill recently approved by the Graduate Council and the Faculty Senate provides for a faculty member to chair the Council. Ralph Cupelli, assistant to the vice president, will continue to provide support for reports, special projects and internal office communications. ☛

Apollo 17 Commander Featured By "Monday Nights In Ryle"

One of the last men to walk on the moon is coming to Northeast. Capt. Eugene A. Cernan, commander of Apollo 17, will speak at 8 p.m., Nov. 2, in Baldwin Auditorium.

Cernan served 20 years as a naval advisor for the U.S. Navy; 13 of his naval years were spent in direct involvement with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) United States Space Program as an astronaut. While with NASA, Cernan carried out three different space flights.

Lyceum To Feature Edward James Olmos

"America's most visible spokesman for the Hispanic community" will bring his story to the Northeast campus Nov. 7 as part of the University's Lyceum Series. Best known as Jaime Escalante from the movie *Stand and Deliver* and as Lt. Castillo from the long-running television series *Miami Vice*, actor and director Edward James Olmos will present "We're All In The Same Gang" at 7:30 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium. Free tickets for students, faculty and staff are available at the Student Activities Board Office, SUB.

Raised in gang and drug infested barrios of East Los Angeles, Olmos has become a spokesperson for the Hispanic-American community. His roles in *Stand and Deliver* and in plays *Zoot Suit* and *American Me* depict the barriers faced by Hispanics and the spirit to overcome them.

Olmos has received an Emmy Award and the Golden Globe Award for his work on *Miami Vice* and an Academy Award nomination for *Stand and Deliver*. He also received a Tony nomination for *Zoot Suit*, a musical drama about the famous "Sleepy Lagoon" murder case.

Olmos continues as an advocate in his home community. Following the Rodney King riots, he was one of the first public figures to rebuild fire-bombed neighborhoods.

Cernan called his voyages into space both a spiritual and philosophical experience. But he says it was not the actual landing on the moon that was so exciting but rather looking back on Earth.

"When you look back at the beauty of our planet, it's overpowering," Cernan said.

Cernan is chairman of the board and president of the Cernan Group, Inc. and the Cernan Corp., space-related technology and marketing firms. He also acts as a Technical Consultant for ABC Television in conjunction with ABC News and Special Events programming. ☛

"Their performance was simply remarkable," said Emmanuel Nnadozie, director of the McNair Program. "They were among the best to present at the conference."

Eleven of these students are now preparing to present at the Annual National Ronald E. McNair Student Conference in Delavan, Wis., in November. Bertha Thomas, assistant director of the McNair Program, said each school with a McNair program is invited to send three students. This year, she submitted all 11 proposals (one scholar cannot attend).

"I spoke with the director at a conference," Thomas said, "and she said she thought our students were so well prepared last year that it would be fine to sub-

The McNair Program

The McNair Program is designed to encourage first-generation, low-income students, women, minorities, and students with disabilities to pursue a doctoral degree. The program, which is directed by Emmanuel Nnadozie, assistant professor of economics, is funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Education.

Each year, 25 Northeast students are selected to participate in the spring program, which includes seminars about what to expect in graduate school, how to select a graduate school, different kinds of graduate programs, and other topics students who want a graduate education need to learn about.

Each student also chooses a faculty mentor with a doctoral degree, either from Northeast or from Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine (KCOM).

Students can apply for the program at the sophomore, junior, senior, and Master's Degree levels. Applications are accepted during the fall semester for the spring program. Interested students should contact Thomas 785-4142 or Nnadozie 785-4099.

mit all eleven."

The best projects from the 1994 scholars will be published in the "McNair Scholarly Review."

In addition to the seminars and research projects, this year's McNair scholars have started study groups for graduate school entrance exams. A McNair Alumni Club was started to provide experiences, activities and information to McNair scholars who have finished the program but

have not yet graduated.

"It's a way to have some continuity from year to year," Thomas said.

Now in its third year, the McNair Program is searching for its 1995 scholars. All McNair programs run on a three-year cycle. To continue the program, Northeast must reapply for a McNair grant.

"I anticipate that we'll get the grant," Thomas said. "But there's no guarantee at all."
