PRE-REGISTRATION PROCEDURES FOR THE SPRING SEMESTER have been changed. Students living in University housing will receive their spring registration packets by mail. Students who do not plan to pre-register should return their packets to the Registrar's Office, 104 Administration/Humanities Building. All students living off campus who plan to pre-register may obtain their registration packets from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Wednesday, Nov. 5-7, in the Registrar's Office. All forms in the packet need to be completed. Students must have their advisers' signatures on their Permit to Enroll cards before they may pick up course cards. Course cards will be distributed, according to students' class rank and social security numbers, from Dec. 4-7 in the Activities Room of the Student Union Building. Students are responsible for picking up the correct course cards as printed on their Permit to Enroll cards. Schedules of entrance times and information about fees payment are included in the spring schedule of classes, which should be available before Thanksgiving vacation. A \$5 fee will be charged for class changes made after the first two weeks of the spring semester.

JOHN M. SWOMLEY JR., professor of social ethics at St. Paul School of Theology at Kansas City, will discuss several topics today on campus. At 8:30 a.m. Swomley will speak on "The President's Role in Foreign Policy Toward South Africa and China;" at 9:30 a.m. he will talk on "Ethics in Making Political Decisions;" and at 1:30 p.m. he will discuss SALT II.
