Bryce Jones, Business, presented a paper, "Moral Values in and out of the World of Work," at the national conference for the Association for General and Liberal Studies on Nov. 9 at Pennsylvania State University.

Mary Belle Martin, Fine Arts, recently presented an in-service workshop on "Art in Special Education" in Bellevue, Neb. Special education teachers for Bellevue public schools participated in the workshop.

Dale Jorgenson, head of Fine Arts, was elected national chairman of the nominating committee of the National Association of Schools of Music in Philadelphia Nov. 15-18. The association is the national accrediting body for university, conservatory and liberal arts programs in music and music education. He also conducted the Jacksonville, Ill., Symphony Orchestra in a concert on Dec. 2 in Jacksonville. His son, Dale Jorgenson Jr., (B.M.E. 1973, M.A. 1975) performed as guest soloist in the concert.

Lonny Morrow, Special Programs, had a manuscript, "Issues Regarding the Labeling of Children at an Early Age," included in a monograph published by the Iowa Dept. of Public Instruction.
