FRESHMAN STATE LEGISLATORS touring the campus Thursday will be honored at a reception at 5 p.m. in the Quiet Lounge of the SUB. All faculty and staff are urged to attend and welcome the visitors to our campus.

THE MILWAUKEE BALLET COMPANY, acclaimed as one of America's finest and most versatile dance troupes, will be on campus this afternoon through Wednesday, culminating in a public performance at 8 p.m. Wednesday in Baldwin Auditorium.

Wednesday night the company will perform Bach's "Partita," "Sonata a tre" by Albinoni, "Trio" by Ibert and Tchaikovsky's "Nutcracker Suite, Act II."

As part of the two-and-one-half day residency, members of the company will hold several lectures, informal discussion periods, and rehearsals with the University community.

Admission to the performance Wednesday night will be free with a validated University I.D. or Lyceum Series ticket. General admission tickets at \$2 each will be available in the Business Office today through Wednesday and beginning at 7 p.m. Wednesday in the Baldwin Hall ticket window.

The residency is being supported by a grant from the Missouri State Council on the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts.

"HOW TO GET THE JOB YOU WANT" is the topic Virginia McCarthy will be discussing Thursday night during a seminar beginning at 7 p.m. in the Georgian Room of the SUB. The seminar is free and open to the public.

Included in the presentation will be tips on how to match your special skills with the desirable openings, how to write a resume, employment sources, selling yourself on the interview, and salary negotiations. Free career literature will be available and a question and answer period will follow the lecture.

Mrs. McCarthy's syndicated column "Woman's Place" appears in the Sunday Omaha World-Herald and in numerous St. Louis and southern Illinois newspapers. She served as a consultant to the U.S. Small Business Administration for its "Women in Business Forum" held last summer in Kansas City and conducted a seminar similar to the upcoming one on campus for the St. Louis YWCA in October.

The seminar is being sponsored jointly by the Bureau of Placements and the Office of Campus Activities.

MARCHING 100 PLUS will travel to St. Louis Saturday to entertain during the halftime of the Cardinals-Colts game. The theme of the show is the Weekend Warrior in "Let's Get Away From It All."
