PRE-REGISTRATION will begin at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday in the Activities Room of the Student Union Building and will continue through noon Friday. Course cards will be distributed according to students' class rank and social security numbers. Schedules of entrance times and information about fees payment are in the 1979 Spring Schedules. Prior permission must be obtained from the Registrar if a student wishes to enter the registration area at any time other than that assigned. All students must turn in their registration packets prior to leaving the building. The student will not be pre-enrolled for any courses unless his registration packet is turned in.

THE DEADLINE for dropping all fall semester classes is Friday. The signature of the adviser and initials and drop code from the instructor are required on the drop slip. Drop slips may be assessed and paid for at the same time as students turn in their pre-registration packets during pre-enrollment this week. Payment is assessed at the Cashier's Window in the Administration/Humanities Building. The Registrar's Office will be closed all day Tuesday through Thursday and until 1 p.m. Friday due to pre-registration.

THE 14TH ANNUAL CHRISTMAS CANDLELIGHT CONCERT will be presented by the NEMO Singers at 3 p.m. Sunday and at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 11, in Baldwin Auditorium. Directed by Clay Dawson, assistant professor of music, the singers will perform familiar Christmas carols and compositions.
